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COUNTY MATCH CAPTAIN: Owing to business commitments that are likely to take him abroad during the soming season, the County Match Captain, Mr. Duce, has resigned. His place has been taken by Mr. D.G. Levens of 15 Bruce Road, Wealdstone, Middlesex. Readers wishing to be considered for selection in. Middlesex County matches are asked to contact him as soon as possible.

PRESIDENT: Mr. A.F. Stammwitz has been elected President of the Association for the year 1961/62.

Anyone interested in taking on some voluntary work on behalf of the County is invited to write to the President at 5 Clifford Road, Hounslow West, giving brief details of what he is prepared to do to help. It is understood for example that the Tournament Secretary wishes to relinquish his duties after the tournaments now in progress are concluded.

MIDDLESEX CHAMPIONSHIP: Latest information regarding the Championship is that this is likely to be won by Mr. D.E. RUMENS, although A.Y. GREEN still has a chance to tie. In the Candidates Tournament a play off is at present taking place.

1961 JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS: These took place during September in Hayes. Full details are given in the Junior Section of this Bulletin. The 1961 Senior Under-18 Championship title was gained by R. Lancaster of the City of London School after a play off with R. Gronau. The Under-15 Junior Championship title went to W. Hartston, also of City of London School; he had 8½ points from 9 games.

For the first time the number of competing clubs in the Eastern Zone are more numerical than those competing in the Western Zone.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY 1960/61 INDIVIDUAL RECORDS: The 1960/61 Match Captain, Mr. Duce, states that a departure has been made this year in the presentation of the annual individual averages. The three matches against Essex, Surrey & Cambridge have been treated separately as the standard of opposition from these counties is so remarkably different from the remainder that the grouping of the lot together would present an unrealistic picture of the results.

10 players played against the three counties named and the results recorded under the columns 'C' for Cambridge, 'E' for Essex and 'S' for Surrey show for each player first his board number and then the result. The fifth column gives the average board number and the sixth the average result expressed as a decimal of unity. Averages of players who played in only two of these matches and those of players who played in the remaining county matches will be available later.



Jonathan has now won the British Championship four times in succession the longest sequence of wins since the days of H.E. Atkins and something indeed to be proud of. We look forward in the not so far distant future to hear he has attained Grandmastership.

THE ENGLAND -v- HOLLAND.MATCH was played at Cheltenham on 7th & 8th October over 10 boards and was a double round affair. England gained a meritorious win by 13 to 7 and Messrs L.W. Barden (Surrey) and A.S. Hollis (Oxford) won both their games.playing at Boards 6 & 10 respectively.

COUNTIES & DISTRICT CORRES ONDENCE CHAMPIONSHIP 1961: Our congratulations go to Suffolk on being runners-up in the Ward-Higgs Trophy Competition just one point behind Gloucester who gained first place. Opportunities for strong over-the board play are not plentiful for players in the outlying counties but this not because of lack of real interest in the game or lack of ability. Correspondence play gives players in these counties the chance to show their mettle and they avail themselves in no small way of the opportunity of proving this. Well done! Suffolk.

BRITISH CHESS PROBLEM SOCIETY: This Society meets on the last Friday of each month at St. Bride's Institute from 6.30 p.m. and the Hon. Secretary, Mr. G.W. Chandler, 46 Worcester Road, Sutton, Surrey asks me to to make known that new members should apply to him for further details. Lectures on Problem Themes are arranged periodically and new problem ideas are debated and thrashed out every meeting night. Dr. Lasker was a keen problem enthusiast as I know from personal experience and contact with him in the mid-thirties.

JUNIOR NEWS.

THE SUNDAY TIMES NATIONAL SCHOOLS: On the 28 & 29th of July after the circulation of the last Chess Fare' the semi-finals and finals of the 1960/61 Competition were staged at the Rembrandt Hotel, London, Colfe's School met Western Super-Mare Grammar School in the semi-final and scored a meritorious 4-2 win. In the Final Colfe's School met Hove Gr. Schooland again won 3½-2½. This Lewisham Grammar School thus became the Sundat Time Champion School for 1961 and fully deserved their success.

Mr. Stammwitz reports that in the 1961/62 competition - the Zenal stages are now being fought out - 388 teams are taking part, a new record and lists 29 situate in Middlesex.alone. There is no doubt about the popularity of this competition and the success is in no small measure due to the voluntary work put in by the County Junior Organisers who run in the main the Zonal Section and the School Chess Clubs who arrange the teams under the supervision of the masters-in-charge, We like them all to know their work for the juniors is very very much appreciated.

LONDON SCHOOLS CHESS LEAGUE: This League which has been functioning since 1911 celebrates this year its 50th year of junior chess activity in the greater London area, From a mere dozen schools in those early days the league now caters for 42 Schools in the Greater London area and runs a Junior Tournament side by side with a Senier one, Many of its older players take part in Senior County Matches with not

a little success as some the Senior County players know too well.

THE 1961 GLORNEY CUP INTERNATIONAL:- This was played in Glaskow this year and again the English Team proved much the strongest beating Ireland 5-1, Scotland 5-1 and Wales 4-2. The two SCCU members of the team were Messrs N.J. Argyris of St. Paul's School and G. James of Brighton who holds the current SCCU Under-18 Boys' Championship title. Mr. K.J. Bloodworth, the Chairman of the English Glorney Cup Committee wishes me to thank all those who contributions both financially and otherwise helped to make this junior international event such a success going on to remark that there is no doubt that the experience gained by the young enthusiasts chosen to represent their country helps to spur them on towards becoming international players in the senior field. With this view I entirely concur. ESSEX JUNIOR NEWS:- Mr. J.R. Read who has once more resumed his activities as Essex Junior County Organiser reports that the out for Junior Chess in Essex is indeed a bright one. He is desirous of forming an Essex Modern Schools League, an Under-18 Junior Individual Championship expansion and the acquisition of five junior trophies for competition among the county's juniors in five different events. Essex Schools have been presented with a trophy for perpetual competition by Miss. Theodora Durning Lawrence, a director of the body that controls activities at Durning Hall. This competition will take the form of a Jamboree run on similar lines to the S.C.C.U. Junior Championship. HERTFORD JUNIOR NEWS: Mr. K.L. Woodland, the Hertfordshire Junior Organiser, sends a report of the success of Hertfordshire's Juniors in the 1960/61 Under-18 Correspondence Championship, They tied for First place with Nottingham and Yorkshire with 8 points out of 12. (Middlesex were 2 point behind) This result is very pleasing both to the County and to the S.C.C.U. and Hertfordshire Juniors, becoming a force to be reckoned with in over-the-board play no doubt can attribute this increasing proficiency to the experience gained in correspondence chess. They have evidently absorbed the advice Keres always gives to young players desirous of improving their game. Congratulations Hebts. Juniors! MIDDLESEX JUNIOR NEWS: - During the first week in September 21 Middlesex Senior Boys and 66 Under-15 Boys & Girls attended Sandgate Hall, Hayes, to decide on whose head was to rest the 1961/62 Championship titles. The Senior competed in a 7 Round Swiss and the Juniors a 9 Round Swiss controlled by their Junior Organiser, Mr. R.M. Sinolair. 
JUNIOR COUNTY MATCH RESULT.
