



Dear Richard,

I have read your comments on "match defaults" in the latest SCCU Bulletin. Ι feel that where a team ties on match points, then if either team won a match by default this result should be deleted, also the defaulters' corresponding match against the other county tying should be deleted and the remaining game points would be decisive, i.e.

 $101\frac{1}{2} - 20 = 81\frac{1}{2}$ Middlesex Kent $95\frac{1}{2} - 13 = 82\frac{1}{2}$

Another way is to divide the games total by the number of matches actually played, i.e.

= 11.64 games per match Middlesex 812/7

Kent $95\frac{1}{2}/8 = 11.94$ games per match Regards, Bob MacBrayne

Dear Mr Haddrell,

Payment for grading: - Anomalous grades arise if not all games are included. Recently, Cambridge did not send in results and at least one player who should have been graded about 170 played in an U130 tournament, scored 6/6 and walked off with first prize of about £100. This problem is bad enough already without it being worsened deliberately. Some players would be very happy if they were ungraded and I find Oxfordshire's action in distorting grades absolutely disgusting.

Despite all this, I see no reason why tournaments or leagues should not pay for grading. Anyone who plays in a tournament or plays for a club pays for the privilege, so funding should not be a problem.

Dear Mr Haddrell,

I would just like to emphasize one point which I don't think you made in connection with your comments on the proposed grading payment.

The main reason that I proposed deferment for a year at the SCCU AGM was that the scheme did not appear to have been fully considered before the plan was put to Council. In particular, it seemed that a substantial amount of money would be raised without a clear idea of how it would be apportioned and used. It was primarily on the financial logic (or lack of it) that I felt that the planners should go back to the drawing board...

I do agree that all organisations sharing in the benefitsof grading should contribute and have no objection to a grading levy as such provided it is directed primarily at those organisations not otherwise contributing and the estimated revenue is identified and its allocation properly considered and agreed in Council so as to further chess activities.

REPORT ON THE 1979 CRADING LIST

We must thank and congratulate our team of graders this year on an excellent job in calculating all the grading in time to be included in the list this year. All county results have been received, all the usual leagues except the Hillingdor League, and, as far as I know, all congress results except the big Aaronson Congress. The full list is given below.

As I write Trevor Jones is putting the finishing touches to a system of handling alterations and corrections to this year's grading by computer. Hopefully this will enable us to produce the grading list earlier than before. Even if we are not earlicr this year, we should produce it earlier in subsequent years as a result of this year's work. I should mention that the main work involved is amending the names and initials of players who are new to the system, so that their results coming from different sources are correctly added together or, where appropriate, the grading for different people with the same name is kept separate. Over 500 amendments to details of new players sent in by graders are involved and it is the handling of these amendments which has delayed publication in the past.

The National List of players of 200+ has been carefully agreed with the Director of National Grading. In addition the BCF have made it their responsibility to co-ordinate the grading of players to a level which this year has been lowered to 175. Until the new computerised alteration system has been perfected, there may be items of grading which we have been unable to advise to the National Grader for players between 175 and 199, and so the grades we publish may differ from the list prepared by him but hopefully there will only be a handful this year.

I would like to emphasize the importance of match captains and other responsible county and club officials showing players' names correctly spelt with full correct initials and to send in results promptly. The better this work is done, the better the grading list will be.

We could still do with some further assistance with grading of congresses and

county match results, together with junior competitions, and I would appreciate hearing from anyone who is prepared to undertake this work.

FRIENDS OF CHESS

Harry Golombek, Chairman, reports that expenditure for 1978/9 exceeded income by over £1000, despite an increase in income. Nearly £4000 was paid out: £3300 for team events and tournaments (four international tournaments in this country, and four British teams in events abroad) and £546.50 to assist individuals (Speelman, Nunn, Goodman, Plaskett, Jackson, Caldwell) to travel to foreign events.

There were 198 Friends and 40 Patrons in 1978/9. Both figures were increases on the previous year's, but new members are always sought after. Arthur J Morrell died recently. He was a leading Essex and Ilford (London League) player during the fifties and sixties and had been Secretary of the Essex Chess Association for five years.

DAVID WOOD MEMORIAL TRUST

GL Smith, Secretary of the Trust, has sent an account of its activities. Your Editor knew nothing about the Trust until a couple of weeks ago - which probably proves more about your Editor than it does about the Trust; but in case there are others, in Essex and elsewhere, who share his ignorance we reproduce below a substantial extract from the Trust's recent publicity sheet.

Since the David Wood Memorial Trust was founded in October 1969 many Essex junior players have benefited from our financial support. The Essex junior team now has its own sets, boards and clocks, provided by the Trust; we have provided a number of trophies for the junior competitions; supported training for promising players and also provided grants towards juniors' participation in Union and National level events.

The Trustees believe that in the light of the experience of the first 10 years the Trust fills a need in the promotion of junior chess in Essex. During those 10 years Essex junior chess has come on in leaps and bounds (though the Trust cannot claim all the credit!)... The Trustees are constantly looking for ways to expand their activities and to do this we need to increase the capital investment of the Trust. The recent Wanstead "30-30" Tournament was a fund raising venture for the Trust and, though limited in its size, the event... added approximately £110 to the Trust's capital investment.

But we are not only concerned with getting money in - our principal task is to spend it. Our current level of cash available for expenditure is just over £100 annually. In the last year we have provided a prize for the best junior score in the Chelmsford Major 1978; provided another six clocks for junior use and made available a sum of money to assist a team in travelling to the U14 jamboree in Walsall where they finished equal second. A grant towards expenses of participation in the BCF Congress at Chester has been accepted by a junior candidate. Projected expenditure includes the purchase of further clocks and also prizes of £5 each for the best game played by an Essex junior in the U18 and U15 categories in the 12 months commencing 1st September 1978...

Currently the Trustees find they have to take the initiative in discovering where their financial support is needed, and feel that if their activities were more widely known, those responsible for the organisation of junior chess in Essex, whether in schools or clubs, could approach the Trust where financial assistance is required...



CHEATS' GUIDE

You are White in the diagram position. It is your move, and you have just touched your opponent's Bishop. You regret this, because you have now seen that QxB is not a very good move. The Controller is watching, and it is obvious that you touched the Bishop on purpose. You did not say anything that could plausibly be passed off as "j'adoube". What do you do? (Quickly!)

Answer: Without the least hesitation you touch your own Bishop. You can now play the only winning move: Bf6 mate. When your opponent's howls of protest have subsided, you draw his attention (and the Controller's) to Article 8.2 of the Laws of Chess: "If the player having the move touches one of his own pieces and one of his opponent's pieces, he must capture his opponent's piece with his own piece: or if this is not

nent's piece with his own piece; or, if this is not possible, move his own piece." Experienced rule-riders will know that speed is of the essence here, since any delay in touching your own Bishop will almost certainly induce the Controller to break the rules in your opponent's favour, and you don't want all the bother of appealing to FIDE.

Speaking of FIDE, when are they going to re-write the Laws? (Yes, this is your Editor off on one of his hobby-horses again.) This particular loophole seems easy enough to plug. I vaguely remember - but have not checked - that the Laws used to say you had to move or capture the first piece touched which could be moved or captured. They say so now, if the pieces touched are all of the same colour. I don't us estand why this can't apply when you've touched pieces of both colours; except when you've touched a piece of each colour "simultaneously", in which case the present rule seems reasonable and just. Maybe this case is what FIDE had in mind; if so they should have said so. It is not hard to draft a simple and workable definition of simultaneity. As the rules stand, it is perfectly legal to pick up an opponent's piece, put it back, think for twenty minutes and then not take the piece at all.

The Advanced Cheat does not confine himself to legal ploys. The most sophisticated Cheating technique I have personally experienced is known as "petomania".* It actually infringes Rule 19.1c, but no player subjected to it is likely to think of that at the time. I came across the technique a few years ago when invited to an acquaintance's house for some "friendly" games. He had a large Alsatian dog which lay under the table throughout the session. Without dwelling on what the Alsatian did under the table, I will say that it did nothing to improve the atmosphere between me and my opponent.

BCF COUNCIL

The 75th annual Council Meeting held on the 14th July seems to have been largely taken up with uncontroversial routine matters. If you missed it, there is a full report in the August News Flash. Things got controversial when it got to PFG, of course. We quote from News Flash: "The West of England, Northern Counties and Midland Counties are all reported to favour a principle of grading all available results, but actually publishing the grades of players who had registered. The Southern Counties regard this as administratively impossible, and prefer to publish all grades but to include in the calculation only data from contributing events. The various arguments pro and contra were brought out again, with particular emphasis from West and Northern delegates both on grading as a privilege and on the propriety of the South maintaining its position when in a minority. Eventually a moderate resolution was taken to the effect that the Board report be noted, without further mandatory action, but that the South be asked - if unable to go along with the recommendations of the other three Unions - to ensure that their procedures were not "in conflict" with the other Unions'." (Some chance! -Ed.)

The Budget Meeting of the Council will be in Birmingham on Saturday 26th April 1980, and the next Annual Meeting on 12th July, also in Birmingham.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP FINAL

A POSSIBLE GRADING SERVICE

The computer records in Tunbridge Wells contain a great deal of information on players past and present. Most of it does not get into the published Grading List. • It is possible to extract this information, or parts of it, in any number of different ways and Trevor Jones, the Grading Programmer, has been wondering whether there is a potentially useful service to be gained from this.

Briefly, organisations or individuals could commission special print-outs of selected information. There would obviously be a fee, and the proceeds would go to

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offset the Union's grading expenses. (These are no longer fully covered by sales of Grading Lists.)

To give an idea of the sort of thing that could be produced, here are some possibilities:

Statistical calculations: average grade of all players, or of juniors by ages; standard deviations, changes from year to year, numbers of games.

Input information: lists of players changing clubs; itemised grading input for all players in a given club or county.

Master information: lists for a county or club of its players giving any desired information, printed in numerical, alphabetical, club or grade order - could be a selective list (e.g. minimum grade or minimum number of games, or active players only.).

A quite separate possibility - independent of the current SCCU grading system is the development of programs for the grading of leagues or tournaments. Mr Jones already has one for his own use, but it would need modifying to make it suitable for general use. This could be done if there was sufficient interest among congress organisers willing to pay for it.

Any organiser interested in pursuing these thoughts is invited to write to HT Jones, Flat 2, 11 Guildford Rd, Tunbridge Wells, Kent (SAE please). Do remember that we are only sounding out interest at this stage: we make no promises that anything will come of it.
