EDITORIAL

GRADING

At a meeting on Saturday 10th November SCCU graders had an opportunity to learn more about the BCF's centralised grading plans. Bryan Threadgall (Director of National Grading) and Vic Jenson, who is masterminding the computer angle, demonstrated some of the programs that will be available and heard graders' views on a number of topics. Philip Clemow was pleased with the way the meeting went and feels useful things were learnt on both sides.

Vic Jenson is not an "outsider". He has been a grader, often in senior posts, since 1956. He knows what it's like at the sharp end. His system will eventually comprise some 40 programs, of which getting on for half are already written. Some of these will be available to graders working with their own micros; one which was actually demonstrated at the meeting is designed for grading Swiss tournaments. It would obviously be possible to provide for match grading as well. Graders preferring to work with pencil and paper in the old-fashioned way (well, there's no accounting for taste - Ed) will still be able to.

Clearly there is still a lot of work to do, but graders came away with a tangible impression of progress made. (One thing that emerged, incidentally, was that few of those present had Sinclair Spectrums; the Beebs had it by a small majority. There is no reason in principle why graders' programs should not be adapted to run on different machines, though obviously that would mean extra work.)

The Bulletin, in common with a number of other graders, could not make this ting. (It had a match.) There is to be a repeat in the Midlands next month (8th, think) which SCCU graders will be welcome to attend.

RST MOVES: How to start a chess game

chess game David Pritchard: Elliot Right Way Books 124pp 95p

"'First Moves' is an opening primer for the complete novice... It is a book to be read, not studied... It ends where other opening books begin." Quite so. And when our novice gets to the other opening books, he won't find many of them written in descriptive notation. I cannot understand why this one is. Algebraic is the norm these days; teaching descriptive to beginners seems perverse.

Anyway. It is, as the blurb suggests, an attempt to teach general principles rather than variations. ("Are you committing these positions to memory? I hope not it is only the ideas you are meant to be absorbing.") I liked the approach. After a short introductory section on the most basic ideas, we go on a quick tour of the openings. None is treated in detail; some are not even named. The idea is to introduce the reader to as many different types of position as possible, so he can react in the right way when faced with the unfamiliar. Pritchard advises eclecticism, not specialisation. (That can come later.) Perhaps on purpose, there is no particular plan to the book. Not that I could see, anyway. Pawn storms and position play, analysis and axioms come jumbled up any old how. And why not?

The presentation of the book is not, I think, quite what it might be. Diagrams tend to get separated from the moves they go with; often by lines, sometimes by pages. And I was infuriated by Pritchard's trick of turning the diagram over every so often and showing the position from Black's end. It may be true that "you should get used to looking at positions from both sides", but I found it merely confusing. (The fault may be mine. I habitually analyse my adjourned games from White's end, even when I'm Black. Does anyone else share this peculiarity?)

After extensive testing (though I couldn't give it to the First Years, because of the notation) my copy has refused to fall apart, and value for money it has to be at 95p. I would recommend it, if it weren't for the notation. RJH

It is to be regretted that there have been two match defaults (20-0) so early the season. In the first instance Kent III defaulted to Kent IV, though the rrect procedure was observed. In the second, however, Cambridge failed to notify their opponents of the home venue under Rule 9(c) of the SCCU County Match Rules. This resulted in the award of this match 20-0 to Surrey I.

I would also ask match captains to check adjudication details on their players' claims, which have, so far, been rarely correct.

It is further to be regretted that there have been two instances of refreshments not being provided at County Matches; one by accident and the other as a matter of policy. I would request strongly that, if refreshments are not being provided, then the visiting match captain be informed well in advance by the home match captain, so that his players may have the opportunity to make other arrangements.

Sorry that my first comments as CMC should be grumbles, but these are issues important to the equable and civilised conduct of our Competitions!!

Cambs v Surrey (Championship, 17th Nov) has been declared won for Surrey because the Cambs match captain failed to notify his opposite number of the venue. We understand he was hard to contact as well. It is possible that Cambs may raise the matter with the SCCU Executive (next meeting 23rd Nov).

There are some proposals in the air for new scoring systems in the SCCU County competitions. One would, effectively, deduct a game point for each default. The others could be be more far-reaching. Details later if it comes to anything.

BCF stage County Matches

The BCF has written to the Unions asking them to state, formally, whether they will be taking up their entitlement to two places in the National stage of the Minor Counties. (The EACU has one.) Of the 25 questionnaires sent out by Dr Opie, 18 have now come back. Results: Rate of Play.

13 favour the current rate (40 in 2) and 5 the suggested rate of 54 in 2 hrs 15 min or 21 hrs. No change is likely.

KO competitions (Montague-Jones, Ebony/Amboyna).

Excluding the first team captains, whose opinions may not be relevant, 9 out of 10 have replied. We don't know who the tenth one is. The overall result is 3 in favour of an M-J KO and 5 in favour of an AE one. On the face of it (though we have not seen a breakdown to make it absolutely clear) there is a case for running these

competitions after the conclusion of the leagues. At all events, it will be proposed at the next Executive meeting. Where the Trophies, if any, will come from is not obvious.

Quick-play Competition.

8 match captains favoured a one-day competition and one a weekend one. It will be proposed that a one-day event be held. The rules would have to be worked out by the Executive.

<u>NATIONAL CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP</u>, sponsored by Legal and General, really is giving away money this year. (We've only just got round to working it out.) Zone winners in the main championship get £50 and a clock. There are 12 zones, with only 6 or 7 teams per zone; so only two matches for your £50 if you happen to get a round 1 bye. That's most of the entry fees back in zonal prizes before you even get to the inter-zone. A little problem with byes, though: recipients have the right to opt out of the competition and go into the Plate along with the first round losers. There are 21 recipients. Sensibly, the organisers have decided to keep them all in the competition proper and let them into the Plate if they lose in round 2 (otherwise someone's liable to get a bye into a zone final). Why not 7 or 8 teams per zone next year? (No, it might not leave room for the late entries. But the entry form categorically states the entries will not be accepted. Why not stick to that for a change? People might en start taking it seriously!)

Clubs in the Major may not have noticed the rule which says "No team may contain any player with a grade of 175 or equivalent or over... No team must contain more than one player with a grade of 160 or equivalent or over..." Think about it. It's different in the Minor.
