EDITORIAL

Happy new year. About a quarter of this issue is devoted to a review. I make no apologies for this: it interested me and that's what counts. But if you want more about chess, or chess results, or chess players, you know what to do. Point it in my

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive met on Friday 29th November 1985, in its old home at St Brides where the squeaky chairs welcomed us back like old friends. Your Editor will not say whether the absence of a bar at St Brides affected the deliberations.

(1) Data Protection Act. A report back from the BCF Management Board dispelled some of the fog. It appears the BCF will (?may) negotiate an agreement with the Registrar whereby any grader working by computer can enter into a contract with the Federation. This contract would prevent his divulging data in any way not approved by the BCF; and in return he would be covered by the BCF's £22 registration fee. Swiss pairing by computer <u>is</u> within the scope of the Act, incidentally, and of course the grading contract won't cover it.

(2) SCCU Council Meeting 1986 has been moved from the 21st to the 28th June because of a clash with a Management Board meeting. The venue has yet to be fixed.

(3) Junior Matters. The Executive noted the resignation of DJ Blackman, the

SCCU Junior Organiser, and appointed PE Morrish to take his place.

The SCCU Under 18 Jamboree will be held on the 1st March 1986 at the City of London School. There was much discussion, and not for the first time, of the pros and cons of moving this event around. The consensus seemed to be that nearly everyone except the host county would suffer.

The Under 14 Jamboree is to be an official SCCU event. No decision was taken h the 40-board Metropolitan matches; as they don't seem to be provided for in the Junior budget, they would presumably have to be self-supporting. We assume they generally are anyway.

Someone remarked that the new Minor Counties Junior competition ought not to be run on a Union basis. The eligible counties would probably be peripheral ones falling naturally into groups with peripheral counties from other Unions. No doubt it's too late to do anything about that this year.

The BCF had asked our reaction to a Midlands proposal that a player should not be permitted to play for one county as a junior and another as an adult. SCCU will not support this proposal.

- (4) SCCU Individual Championship will be incorporated, as usual, in the Sutton Easter Congress. There will be a prize of £50 as last year. Ties for the SCCU nomination to the British Championship will be split in favour of the highest graded player.
- (5) County First Team Match Captains met on the 27th September. At least the Cambs, Essex, Kent and Sussex ones did (and Middx sent apologies). They discussed a number of things, and disliked the new rotation of fixtures. A further meeting is planned.
- (6) Junior Training event 14-15 December was reported to be on target for the Tped-for 30 participants. Grades ranged from 156 to 206. (A brief report of the event appears in the Junior section of this issue.)
- (7) SCCU Grading. As reported last time, the London and Middx Leagues submitted their results late and the Union has had to produce a supplementary list to accommodate them. It emerged that a number of other significant events had also gone in late. The major offenders will probably make a financial contribution towards the extra costs.
- (8) BCF Grading. Philip Clemow reported that a detailed timetable has been
- produced for the switch to national grading. (For more details, see below.)

 (9) The Executive welcomed a Midland Counties suggestion for a match between our respective Third Team Champions, for an unofficial national title. (Your Editor assumes that Fourth Teams would be eligible.)

NATIONAL GRADING

If things are on schedule, all Union data should have reached the BCF computer by the 31st December 1985. The master list should go out to graders in mid January. Sinclair Spectrums plus software will be issued to the Unions about the end of January. There are not likely to be more than two per Union! Graders with Spectrums have been asked whether they are prepared to transcribe data for those without. We await their answers with interest. (Transcription to cassette looks to be a real weakness in the system. The BCF computer can't accept data in any other form. SCCU, transcription has always been done at the computer end; mostly by Grieveson, Grant whose charge included an element to cover this. The additional manpower now required looks like a hidden extra on the costs.)

Grading results, on cassette, have to reach the BCF by the 1st July and it is hoped that the new Union Grading Lists will be available on the 1st September.

On the Data Protection Act, Paul Buswell has written confirming many of the details published in the Executive report. He thinks your Editor's lunchtime tournaments for the kids at school are probably exempt on the grounds that they are 'purely for your private recreational purposes". Not quite sure how to take that. We think they're OK anyway because no one objects (they'd better not!) to the data being held on disc, and they all have every opportunity to inspect it — the complete file goes on the notice board every week. As for our suggestion last time that an event might be exempt if you made it a condition of entry that no one objected etc., he has reservations which are too technical for the Bulletin to understand.

SCCU JUNIOR TRAINING WEEKEND at Highbury, 14-15 December 1985

Eric Croker reports that the first official SCCU training event went ahead as planned, with help from the BCF who provided a GM coach at rather short notice after the scheduled one had dropped out. Financial asistance came from the NatWest by arrangement with the BCF. 32 juniors accepted invitations and 29 actually turned up. We don't know what became of the other three. Only Berks and Cambs were correpresented. Ages ranged from 12 to 17, and grades from 152 to 206. They spent most of the weekend in three separate groups with three separate tutors (ND Short, RG Wade, PA Lamford). All the tutors gave clock simuls and they all had quite a hard time of it. (Short scored +4 =4 -2; we hear that one of the others got something like 1½/9.) Sessions were spent on openings, tactics, planning, position play and endings, and Nigel Short's commentaries on some of his own games were much appreciated. Your Editor has seen the positions the juniors were given as homework, and he can't do many of them. The most fiendish of the lot is said to be the one which goes 8/6pk/3K4/16/191P4/1P6/8: W to move; what result? We don't know the answer but we know where to get it. Any offers?

After the event the juniors were invited to put their own comments in writing and these have been passed to the coaches. Though some suggestions were made for improvements, we gather that the event was much appreciated. (Our own mole isn't sure he learnt much but it was great fun.)

Berks have recently run their own training event with SM Taulbut as Senior Coach. There is one planned for March at the Central London YMCA.

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SCCU JUNIOR JAMBOREES:

<u>Under 14</u> 25 Jan 1985: To encourage weaker counties to take part, Peter Morrish suggests that they may like to produce combined teams. Entries to him by 22nd Jan at the latest.

<u>Under 18</u> 1st March 1985: The Open is a qualifier for the new BCF Minor Counties final as well as the National championship. It seems that under the "experimental" rules everyone except Sussex and Middx is eligible for the Minor because no one else has won the National championship in the last five years. The winner of the SCCU event will go forward to the National championship and the next highest team eligible and interested goes forward to the Minor.

"EXCELLENCE" CHESS COMPUTER

manufactured by Fidelity Inc; available from Competence Ltd, 17 St Martins St, Wallingford, Oxon OX10 OEA (0491 34663). Price £149 (optional mains adaptor £10).

I had never had much experience of chess computers. But when I saw the results this one had been achieving in competitive play I couldn't resist taking Competence up on their offer of one on loan for review purposes. It was a long time coming (demand is heavy), and before it arrived I heard that the machine had been granted endorsement by the BCF, so you can imagine that when it was finally delivered I was quite impatient to get my hands on it.

What came out of the parcel was a plastic box about 11 inches square and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep, with an 8-inch square playing surface on top. A sensible green and off-white board, and the magnetised plastic bits, when I'd found them in their compartment underneath, turned out to sit well on it. The board and men have been designed by chess players. While you wouldn't want to play a serious game with a set of this size, experience showed that it was more than acceptable for casual play. The sensory pads worked well and took very little getting used to. (It beeps modestly mearly every time you press anything. You can turn the beep off, but it is actually helpful.)

Some of the facilities: Playing levels are defined in terms of time controls. There are eight, ranging from 60 moves in 2 minutes to 40 in 2 or $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours. The machine will think in your time, unless you ask it not to (and doing that effectively provides eight more levels). There is also an "infinite" mode in which it just keeps thinking until you tell it to stop, and three mate-finding modes for 2, 3 and 4-movers. You can set up any desired position for it to work on. An optional display ows how far ahead the machine is currently looking, and it will on request tell you le best move it has found so far (or suggest a move for you, if it's your turn). It will play either side, and will change sides with you if you don't like your position. You can take back moves (up to 16 at a time), or force the computer to play a specified move. It will not remember the game and tell you the moves afterwards. It is naturally capable of underpromotion, and knows the 50 move and repetition rules (only no one's told it the new rule that K v K is a draw). Its opening book can be cancelled. It can be switched from mains to batteries or vice versa, while in operation, without losing its memory. Claimed battery life (four of them, costing up to £1 each) is from 100 to 250 hours. The manual, not being Japanese, is fairly comprehensible though I had to find one or two basic things out for myself. (I found out quite a lot of unbasic things by asking Competence, who were very helpful.)

I understand that "Excellence" has basically the same program as the same manufacturer's "Elite", which costs several times as much and has the advantage of being faster. Anyway, how good is it? Well, I wouldn't ask you to accept just my judgment. Matthew Sadler (age 11: 169J) has had an "Excellence" since August. He "...The computer has, in most sharp positions, good tactical vision, often producing unexpected saving moves in otherwise lost positions. It has a particularly handling of the Sicilian defence and of the Pirc.

"Fidelity have succeeded in giving the computer positional ability, particularly in the 1 c4 e6 2 Nf3 d5 3 b3 lines which it seems to play very well. contrast though, it does not handle the Four Knights variation very well.

"The opening book is very good, providing the computer with enough knowledge to stay out of trouble in most cases. There are a few inconsistencies, the trouble being

that the book is cut off too soon.

"Most people imagine that computers, a couple of pawns up in an endgame, will still lose to a strong player. The days of grade 60 strength in the endgame are gone. Nowadays computers handle most endgames quite well, knowing all basic mates and being programmed with orders like pushing passed pawns etc.

"In my opinion, at tournament level 8 (40 in $2\frac{1}{2}$) it plays at around 175 - 180 strength. At blitz, though, it is very quick at seeing tactical threats and cheapos

and must be rated at around 190 - 200.

Matthew gives some examples of "Excellence's" play at level 8. (1) White Sadler, black Computer. rlr3kl/5ppp/q2plb2/plnP4/P2BPP2/N3Q2P/5R1K/1R6. From this position black brought out 36 ...Ne4! and after 37 Rb6 fought its way out of the complications by ... Bd4 38 Qd4 Qa7 39 Nb5 Rc4! winning.

(2) White Computer, black Sadler. r5k1/pplbppbp/3p2pB/q1r1n2n/3NP3/1BN2P2/PPPQ2P1/ 2kR3R. In this Dragon Sicilian position black experimented with 14...Rc5 and white crashed through with 15 Bg7 Kg7 16 g4 Bf6 17 Qh6+ Kg8 18 Nd5! Rd5 19 Bd5 e6 20 g5 Nd5 21 Qh7+ Kf8 22 ed Rc8 23 Qh8+ Ke7 24 Qf6+ 1-0

My impressions are similar. I entered it in a five-minute tournament, playing at 60 moves in 5 minutes - plus a rather inadequate time allowance for me to get the moves in and out - and apart from my own cock-ups like putting wrong moves in, or losing on time for it because I didn't handle it quick enough, it lost only two games (to players graded 206 and 156), drew with a 177 and beat the rest (120 - 150). In casual play with it on this level - but not restricting myself to five minutes - I find it insultingly easy to lose to if I don't concentrate, and easy enough if I do. (It keeps producing good moves that look like misprints.) My grade's 164. Our tame 200J didn't seem to have much trouble with it. I do better against it at tournament level - 40 in $2\frac{1}{3}$ - when I really an trying. Here my score is around 50%, though I do sometimes take advantage of the fact that I know its weaknesses. I'm slightly surprised at reports of it beating players graded 200+. At tournament rates it is tactically very resourceful, but vulnerable if you catch it in a sharp opening it doesn't know. It will not go in for speculative attacks or long combinations, but is capable of squashing you positionally. It has one serious positional weakness and that is a positive liking for bad bishops, which it will go out of its way to achieve. This aside, its positional sense is what impresses me most; though it tends to be materialistic and I have a private bet with myself, which I have not lost yet, that it will never play a positional sacrifice. Its opening repertoire is limited: it employs only two replies to 1 e4, though it knows others if you play them. As White it always opens with e4, d4 or c4 (but Nf3 if you turn its book off). It knows variations of the Lopez to move 98 but plays a beginners' version of the Giuoco Pianissimo. (Again, it knows better lines if you play them against it. It is a pity that perfectly good parts of its opening library seem to be for passive rather than active use.) Of course, if you want it to play a particular line you can tell it the moves.

The ending is still the computer's Achilles heel, though "Excellence" is said to be the best at it and it's certainly better than 60 grade! I agree that it usually knows what to do, and its tactical ability may get it out of trouble even when it doesn't. I've tested it on routine technique and it won't often fail on basic things (simple opposition it always gets right; distant opposition sometimes not, at rates faster than 30 seconds a move). With R and P it's a bit dodgy, at least on the lower playing levels. If the techniques required are even slightly advanced, it will usually fail. It hasn't much idea how to play with Q v P on 7th rank. It wouldn't win the Lucena position in a million years, let alone a five-hour tournament game. It has no trouble mating with Q or R, or a pair of Bs, or three Ns come to that, but give it a B and N and it will rapidly drive you into the "wrong" corner, then shuffle its B around until kingdom, or 50 moves, come. It could have sacrificed a B against me the other day in order to leave me with RP and wrong B, but didn't because it didn't know about wrong Bs. (Even so, I couldn't see how I was going to induce it to give up its B for the RP rather than the other one. I needn't have worried. It obligingly I know these criticisms, if they are criticisms, walked its K out of the corner...) are unfair. My informants tell me that the state of the art will not allow programmimng for the numerous specialised techniques required in an ending. I am su you could put some of the most useful ones in; but I wouldn't expect it in a machine of this size and price. So it has to rely on a few general principles plus analysis. And it hardly ever has time to look far enough ahead to solve a non-trivial ending. It knows what to do so long as it's making tangible short-term progress all the time; beyond that it's floundering. I tried two endings on it, one quite hard in human terms (at least I thought so when I first saw it) and the other easy. The hard one was the Saavedra position (you know, White Kb6, Pc6; Black Kal, Rd5: W to move). On two seconds per move the computer played this perfectly, for either side, despite the "cleverness" involved. Though the solution is about seven moves deep, it never had to look that far ahead to see that its moves were the only ones to avoid a draw (or loss). I assume that, as White, it didn't want a draw so long as it had a queenable(!) pawn. The easy one came from a set of positions given to the participants in the recent junior training event at Highbury: White Ka8, Ra7; Black Kb5, Pa6: W to move. The solution is about the same length, and it's just as forcing, and just the sort of line a human player would automatically look at. hadn't the foggiest notion what to do, even at twelve hours a move. There was no short-term progress to be made, and the long-term progress was way over its horizon. Oddly enough, the very next day I was browsing in a 1978 book on computer chess and it explained why it was difficult for a computer to solve the Saavedra position! We've come on since then.

I was never very sure just how far ahead "Excellence" was looking. In one game it swore blind it was looking three moves ahead, then announced mate in six. So I set up a mate in seven for it. To make it easy, every white move was the only possible check-or-capture (check, actually) and every black move was forced, and it found it in eight minutes after an alleged four-move search. Then it took 33 minutes,

and a five-move search (I think), to find the same mate extended to eight moves (and checks). Competence later informed me that when it says it's looking n moves ahead, that is the depth of its full-width search (i.e. the depth to which it is examining every single possibility). This search gets progressively deeper with time, but never, at tournament rates, goes beyond about four moves. On top of the full-width search it will also be doing a further look-ahead in selected lines, with an emphasis on things like checks and captures. Competence did not know, unless I misunderstood them, how much further the selective look-ahead might go; but my experiments suggest (don't they?) that it is three moves. A three-move limit seems rather disappointing, though I fancy there could be good reasons for it. It would mean that in tournament play the maximum look-ahead is about seven moves, maybe eight in an ending.

"Excellence" often forgets its analysis between moves. After announcing mate in n moves, and seeing its opponent's reply, it will go off and have another think before announcing mate in n-1. I am told that this is normal for computers. In fact it will remember its analysis if your move is the one it was expecting - that is, the one it considers best. It will have analysed this move further in your time, and will be ready to continue its analysis when you move. If you play anything else, then not only will its analysis in your time have been wasted, but also it forgets everything it had previously seen and goes back to square one. There is a certain low cunning in its "hint" facility. If you ask it to suggest a move for you, the move it suggests is the very one it's been analysing in your time!

Another foible is that it will sometimes spend quite some time on a move to which there is no reasonable alternative. And, while it will sometimes move instantly, it never, even in the most critical positions, settles down for a good long think. I have not known it to take more than five or six minutes over a move, even at in $2\frac{1}{2}$. Mind you, if it forgets its analysis between moves I can't say I blame it! These characteristics, together with its inability to learn from its mistakes, are the most obvious signs, perhaps the only ones, that you are playing a machine. (The fact that it never resigns, always plays as many spite checks as it can when about to get mated, and acknowledges eventual checkmate with a surly "I lose" rather than "Thank you for a delightful game", is if anything an indication to the contrary.)

There is, now I think of it, another mechanical thing about "Excellence", and that is its lack of common sense. Suppose it's your move, and you have seen that your opponent has an obscure mate in three which you can only prevent by immediately giving up your Queen for nothing. You have, however, another move which will win if he does not play his mate at once. Do you (a) resign? (b) give up your Queen? (c) play the other move and hope he won't see the mate? No prizes for guessing which "Excellence" will do. But I think this is a criticism of computers in general rather than "Excellence" in particular.

Problems up to four moves, of course, "Excellence" solves with ease. Two-movers it does in a couple of seconds, and it did a four-mover in twelve minutes which I wouldn't have done in twelve weeks (and then took another thirteen minutes to confirm that there were no cooks - useful facility for composers).

Grouses/suggestions? Yes, a few. It would be better if the user could select own time control. The ones provided are sensible but not exhaustive. And how about an all-your-moves-in-n-minutes (or quick-play finish) mode? And a built-in clock to show how much time the computer and its opponent have used? Yes, OK, it would cost more. The machine really ought to be able to tell you all the moves of a game after it's over. (More memory required? Well why not, it's only got 2K of RAM.) And it would be nice if, instead of just displaying the best move it had found so far, the computer would also say how good it thought it was. It has a private numerical assessment of how well it's doing, and this could easily be displayed. Apart from its intrinsic interest, it would be useful in determining whether or not it's "solved" the problem you've set it. I appreciate that you can't ask it if it's "found a win" yet; a "win" for it is synonymous with checkmate. But if its evaluation function suddenly leapt upwards you could draw conclusions. One other thing. The program occupies 16K of ROM. Now the manual puts this as 128K bits; which is correct. On the box it says plain 128K, which will lead the unsuspecting purchaser to think he's getting eight times as much program as he is. That's a cheap trick.

My overall assessment? Well, I've devoted a lot of space to things that might not interest the average buyer. You will attach what weight to those you will. If you want a program for solving endgame studies, or doing adjudications, you will look elsewhere and the best of luck to you because I'm sure it isn't written yet and it would want a mainframe to run on if it was. If you want one to play chess with and your grade's below 180-190 (maybe higher, for blitz), "Excellence" is a very good bet indeed. For all I've said about its limitations, it plays a very sharp and very "human" game, and all in all it's better than me, and I have no hesitation in recommending it. Especially at the price.
