EDITORIAL

Your subscription expires with this issue, unless you're one of the handful of oddballs who do their best to confuse me by paying for 18 months at a time. A renewal form is enclosed; send it back straight away if you want to renew. You know you'll forget if you put it off. There is also an order form for SCCU and BCF Grading Lists. County Secretaries are being sent lots of these and they are requested to spread them around when convenient. Please note that Bulletin and Grading List orders go to different addresses and require separate cheques.

The BCF's new policy of selling its grading lists through the Unions - and giving them a cut - is sensible. The main BCF list sold poorly last year, and the Supplementary one hardly at all. (I've met club and county officers who didn't know you could buy it.) The main list will contain many more names this year: the old requirement of 30 games in the previous two seasons is being relaxed to come into line with SCCU policy (18 games). In addition it now looks certain that the North of England players will be included. With the 30-game requirement gone and the North of England in, the BCF main list is now very much the natural buy for congress players. The SCCU list, which costs about the same in terms of pence per player, may still have some appeal for the club and league man. The BCF Supplementary list, containing everyone with less than 18 games, will be a must for congress organisers.

The finances sound complicated to me. The Union will continue to pay royalties to the BCF on copies of the SCCU list sold. Both Union and Federation will lose revenue here as sales drop. They will both benefit, however, from increased sales of BCF lists. Presumably the SCCU's cut on BCF lists is someone's best guess at the amount required to keep everyone solvent. I have not been privy to the negotiations!

The logical next step is a combined list for England, Scotland and Wales.

Whilst news flash chases the ghosts of international incidents, it is implicitly incumbent upon domestic newsletters and bulletins to investigate controversies nearer to home." I will not comment on the editorial policy of the BCF news flash. The Bulletin loves a juicy controversy if it can find one, though it sometimes chafes at the restrictions of being an official Union publication. It hugely enjoys the absurd, and it tries to entertain. But its main objective has to be that of keeping readers informed, in as much detail as possible, on match results and local and Union news. It has no roving reporters, just a letterbox and a telephone. So keep your news coming in! Club news, county news, local league news, anything. And your views and grouses. And remember, the more there is of you the less there'll be of me. In proportion.

SCCU ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING

Council met on Saturday 27th June 1987 at the Great Northern Hotel, Kings Cross (a new venue, but carefully selected to meet the traditional standards of stuffiness). attended, or thereabouts, and every County except Oxon and Cambs was represented. This is your Editor's version of the interesting bits.

(1) Money. The audited accounts showed a net deficit for 1986-7 of nearly £90, much better than the budgeted figure. Most areas of activity seem to have effected savings. Our reserves are going down, however, and it was felt that an increase in revenue would be necessary. The following charges were agreed.

County Levy up from £7 to £8 per levy point.

Grading List: The situation on grading is unclear, but recent changes in BCF proposals for royalty charges could mean things are healthier than we thought. Nevertheless the price will rise from £2 to £2.20 for a single issue by post; for full details, see inside the front cover. As a new departure this year, the Union will also be selling BCF lists (as agents for the Federation).

Bulletin: The price to remain at £2.50. The Bulletin has picked up subscribers over the last year, possibly because of difficulties with the BCF news flash, and a county delegate suggested that circulation might fall again with the "continued improvement" of news flash. We shall have to wait and see. Someone proposed that in future no one should get the Bulletin free - at present all County secretaries do, as well as more than half the Executive Committee - and the proposal secured the same number of votes as it had at the previous AGM. (Two.)

(2) County Matches 1986-7. The County Match Controller reported that there had been 48 defaults, largely from Cambs. There had been 135 adjudications, with 5 appeals of which 3 were successful. On the whole, problems had been fewer than in previous years though refreshments were sometimes a bone of contention.

(3) Kent-Surrey 1986-7. Your Editor had been quietly looking forward to this one, but the debate proved disappointingly urbane. You can't possibly not know what it was about. Kent had had some adjudications disallowed, had been invited by the Executive to get them done after all for grading purposes, and now requested that the results of the adjudications should be counted in the final league table as well (though they accepted that it was impossible to apply them retrospectively for the purpose of deciding who went forward to the BCF stages). Kent's proposal was effectively an appeal against a ruling by the Executive that the tables were final.

Sir Stuart Milner-Barry spoke on Kent's behalf. He felt that it could do no one any harm to have the "right" results in the table for the record, and suggested that this would be the best way to soothe heightened feelings and start the new season in a spirit of reconciliation. Other speakers were concerned that trophies were involved as well as league tables. It was pointed out that Herts, the involuntary beneficiaries of the affair, might at the end of the season have made some appeals against adjudication if they had thought the Kent-Surrey result was liable to get changed. (Your Editor, having studied the final table, thinks this was probably a red herring though he accepts it as a point of principle.) The County Match Controller thought the Executive had already leant too far in Kent's direction.

Kent's proposal was lost by 9 votes to 18.

(4) County Matches 1987-8. There were some Executive proposals on the table for radically changing the second and third divisions. The problem, of course, was that division 2 had shrunk to two teams, Kent II and Middx II, and no one else had a second team strong enough to match them; though it is true that Surrey had alleviated things a bit by saying they wanted their first team to play in the second division in 1987-8. The Executive, or a sub-committee thereof, had considered promotion-and-relegation throughout the three divisions but was worried about the problem of BCF nominations if first and second teams got jumbled up. Accordingly it proposed equalising the strength of teams in the lower divisions by means of lower grading limits (Div 2 U180, Div 3 U160). All second teams would play in the second division. The number of boards in these divisions would be reduced to 16, and the requirement to "nominate" players would be abolished.

It emerged at once that there were serious difficulties with the proposals. Kent objected very strongly to a grading limit which would effectively bar a lot of their second team players from county chess. They were supported in this by Middx and others. It was also pointed out that the BCF second teams limit remained at U200; which would give our nominees very little chance in the BCF stage (unless, of course, Kent or Middx managed to qualify anyway and decided to jettison half their team in favour of stronger players hitherto debarred). Someone suggested that a solution might be to leave the grading limit as it was but encourage the very strong counties to enter two teams of equal strength. There was some feeling that the real answer was promotion-and-relegation throughout (which could not be implemented this year because it had not been proposed).

It was eventually agreed to pass the whole problem back to the Executive for another think. We are stuck with the old system for another year. How many counties can be persuaded to play in the second division remains to be seen.

(5) Juniors. The Junior Organiser reported continuing problems with dates and venues (The London Junior Championships for 1987 looked very doubtful.) At the Lloyds Bank BCF Junior Squad/SCCU Junior Championships held in April, about 56% of the players had been from the SCCU. There had been some disagreement about the (?)unofficial grades used for some juniors. The SCCU budget allowance for juniors had not all been spent, partly because of efficient organisation by the counties and partly because some counties had not put in claims.

An Essex delegate said his county's junior organiser (who had just resigned) felt that 40 boards had become unrealistic in the Metropolitan U18 competition. It was agreed to sound out the other counties involved.

(6) New SCCU administrative structure. Last year's AGM had asked the Executive to come up with proposals for (1) establishing a small "Management Board" for the day-to-day running of the Union's affairs; and (2) ensuring that all counties were represented on the Executive Committee. So it did. The proposals were that the Management Board should consist of the President, Secretary, Treasurer, County Match Controller and Junior Organiser, plus one other to be elected by the Executive. The Officers of the Union would continue to be members of the Executive Committee, but the additional members currently elected at the AGM would be replaced by one nominee from each county (not necessarily the same person each time). The proposals did not stipulate how often the two bodies were to meet, but it was envisaged that the Management Board would do much of its work by telephone and the Executive might meet twice a year, at the beginning and end of the season.

The proposals were carried by the necessary two-thirds majority, and nem con as far as we remember.

(7) Election of Officers. Names and addresses are inside the front cover.

(8) Address by BCF President. The BCF President, David Jarrett, had been invited to attend and give a short address on the problems and achievements of the Federation. He spoke of the improvements, particularly at the junior training level, and acknowledged that there is still some way to go with grass-roots communication.

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive met immediately after the AGM. Its business was mainly routine. It appointed the rules-and-appeals sub-committee (DJ Opie, EE Croker and OV Stobart ex officio; plus RCA Lee-Pentecost and G Parker) and the sixth member of the Management Board (RJ Haddrell). Your Editor will not have been the only one to realise almost instantly that "Management Board" was a rather unfortunate choice of title.

We found ourselves with County Match Structure on the table again. It was thought that Oxon I might be persuaded to play in the second division; which would at least make four teams in the MJ. One county delegate, discovering at the end of the meeting that he was not supposed to have been smoking at it, proposed that smoking should be permitted at Executive meetings. He lost.

The Executive next meets on Friday 18th September. The Management Board will meet earlier in the month to discuss the long-term future of the Union.

#### BCF COUNCIL MEETING

This is the last Meeting in this issue. Promise. The BCF AGM was held on the 11th July. A brief report from our man in Peterborough:

##### (1) Awards.

Presidents Awards for services to chess went to CW Warburton of Cheshire, and to our own JJ Lauder for long service to Wimbledon, Surrey and the SCCU. Mr Lauder served on the SCCU Executive for some 30 years, holding the posts of Secretary and President. He was our immediate predecessor as Bulletin Editor.

In an unusual gesture a Presidents Award was also made to the BBC for their coverage of chess over the years.

Club of the Year award went to Crowborough Albany CC of Sussex.

BCET School Shields went to Kings School Peterborough and to Marlwood School from somewhere in the WECU, not sure where but they won the National Club Minor competition this year. The SCCU had made no nominations.

(2) Greater Manchester. You may not have managed to forget, though your Editor had, that the Greater Manchester Affair was not quite dead. (If you're too young to remember it, skip this paragraph.) The parties had agreed, at the court case which probably happened last year but we can't be bothered checking, to abide by a survey of opinion among the clubs concerned. This has turned out to favour Greater Manchester, narrowly, so the status quo will be preserved. A Lancashire gentleman spoke acrimoniously at the Meeting and threatened, we think, that Lancs might consider withdrawing from the Federation. Your Editor's view is that if we can't make this affair lie down, a ritual outburst once a year in Council will do no actual harm.

(3) The BCF is to streamline its Meetings (one less Management Board meeting a year, if we got it right) and will look at the future role of the Unions. An SCCU representative, in a report to the Management Board on the morning of the Council Meeting, said the Union had had a quiet year. "Quiet?" said someone, and no prizes for guessing who. "The World Championship in London, and you've had a quiet year?"

What do readers think? What is the SCCU for? (Don't say talking about itself. That's only one of its functions.)

#### LETTERS

Dear Sir,

I am writing in the hope of correcting some misconceptions in your note on the Kent-Surrey (Championship) match score on page 9 of your May issue.

As all players are aware, there are only two ways of obtaining a draw in SCCU County Matches. These are: -

- (1) by agreement between the two players during or at the match.
- (2) as a result of ADJUDICATION by the BCF Adjudication Service.

When, however, the BCF Adjudications Secretary has declared the adjudication claims of one County null and void, it follows that the claims of their opponents are granted, whatever these were. In the case of the Kent v Surrey match, the Surrey claims of 3 wins and 2 draws were granted, since the Kent claims had been declared null and void. Hence the Surrey players obtained  $\frac{1}{2}$  point each, while the Kent players received 0 points each.

Finally, as the SCCU County Match Controller, I have no authority whatsoever to alter any decisions of the BCF Adjudications Secretary.

Ed: - And I thought I'd written a carefully neutral note! Actually it's not clear to me what misconceptions (plural) Dr Opie is referring to, since there only seems to be one point of disagreement. I said the ruling that Kent didn't even get the half points had been made by Dr Opie; he seems to be saying, if I read his final paragraph correctly, that it was made by the BCF. But this is nonsense. What the BCF said was "Kent claims void". This certainly means Surrey score what they were claiming, but it doesn't mean Kent have to score zero, unless there's something in the BCF adjudication rules I'm missing. How many points Kent get is up to us.

I happen to think that scoring the games  $\frac{1}{2}$ -0 was absurd. The situation seems analogous to the case where one side claims a draw and the other side doesn't send a claim at all. When this happens you score the game  $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  (and I can quote an Opie precedent for that).

I will add, since I've got started, that I don't think the BCF should have the final say in the result of a game where there are irregularities in the claims. Not in the Union stage of the competition, that is. If one side makes a pig's ear of its claims, it should be the Union's business to decide what to do about it. The BCF are only our agents.

(I would also add, if I were feeling pedantic, that there are at least three other ways of drawing a County match game besides the ones mentioned above. But that's by the way.)

SCCU Bulletin 175:1 - SCCU Junior Championships. May I ask through your columns why the SCCU allows its name to be appropriated for an event it doesn't control?
