EDITORIAL

The Bulletin's been gagged. A minor item at the Executive meeting the other week was deemed confidential; for no better reason, it seems to me, than to spare the blushes of one or two people who'd been inefficient. τ pressed it to a vote but lost 9-3. I now think I was wrong to accept the vote, and I'm sorry. But guessing what it was about will be far more fun than reading it would have been.

There's a serious point here somewhere. I have often censored myself, for reasons good or bad and with varying degrees of reluctance, but I don't think the Executive has ever done the job for me until now. I'm a Union Officer and it presumably has the right. I've never been confortable with that thought.

SCCU EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive met on Friday 14th May 1993 at the Friends House opposite Euston Station. 15 attended. Main points:

(1) <u>Trophies</u>. It was agreed that all trophies, regardless of who's got them and whether he's entitled to hold them, should be present at this year's SCCU Council Meeting on the 3rd July. They will then be taken away for engraving and valuation and returned to the holders as soon as possible.

(2) <u>Equipment</u>. We have something like 50 clocks and 40 sets and boards, on more or less permanent loan to Surrey who pay £30 a year for their use. Very occasionally they get "hired" out to someone else but it is not clear that either we or Surrey make a charge.

bu will remember, if you were paying attention when you read the last issue, that Bruce Birchall has junior events scheduled for Haverstock School and would like a permanent stock of SCCU equipment on the premises. Rather than buying new stock, it was agreed to transfer the existing stock to the school. It is not insured, nor possibly worth insuring unless you can get "new for old" cover, but secure accommodation will be available.

(3) <u>SCCU Game Fee</u>. DR Sedgwick had asked counties how they thought the Union should collect its dues when, or if, the BCF levy disappears. None had replied. It was agreed to propose, at the forthcoming Council Meeting, that starting this year counties should pay a flat rate (say f15) plus so much (say f6) per team entered in the SCCU leagues. The figures quoted would bring in more or less what we get now.

(4) <u>Womens Chess</u>. There was a suggestion, vague and not pursued, to allocate a sum of money for the development of womens chess in the SCCU. It was reported that the BCF Womens Director will not seek re-election.

(5) <u>SCCU Management Board</u>. Skip this item if you like: it was only a passing reference and no discussion took place. The Management Board was set up in July 1987 for the day-to-day running of the Union's affairs. It was always envisaged that its meetings might be telephonic. It met twice in the flesh, soon after its inception, and devoted uch time to "long-term planning" (which was hardly its job). It has done nothing lince, in the flesh or otherwise. Its intended function may well have been usurped, on occasion, by officers acting independently. That's the background. The foreground is that someone suggested, at the May Executive meeting, that the MB should meet routinely December-ish to fill the long gap between the autumn and spring Executive meetings. It was only a casual remark, but the Bulletin is going to comment anyway. It believes that (1) you don't hold meetings routinely on the off chance there'll be something to talk about; (2) the MB was set up for a useful purpose and should be used for it; and (3) it needs a new name.

(6) <u>Grading</u>. Martin Cath, grading secretary, raised the question of George Goodwin's Quickplay events. These are advertised as belonging to the Leigh GP circuit. But it is a condition of the Leigh circuit that all games are submitted for grading, and George Goodwin's QP events, uniquely among London QPs, are not. This will be raised at the next BCF Management Board meeting.

The BCF is negotiating for an annual £2000 sponsorship for its grading list. The firm concerned would expect their name on the various Union lists as well as the BCF national one. This could affect our advertising revenue from other sources, so we would doubtless expect a cut from the sponsorship money.

The BCF Grading Director is standing down. We understand that his motive is a distaste of Management Board politics, and he is prepared to continue his work anyway. (7) <u>Money</u>. Tony Suttill produced draft accounts for 1991-2 and 1992-3. Despite assurances given at the March meeting, the 1991-2 accounts were not yet audited. This was because a query had arisen over a £50 Junior grant awarded to Sussex in spring 1992; apparently the grant cannot be paid until Sussex have produced a statement of accounts (but Sussex's interpretation seems to be different.) It also emerged that we had never paid our £80 entry fee for the SCCU nominee in the British Championship 1990. For some reason it had never been claimed. We decided not to worry about this

reason it had never been claimed. We decided not to worry about this. Results 1991-2: deficit £177. 1992-3: deficit £27. "Monies available" at the moment are £3530. Not sure just how subject to change these figures are.

The Bulletin has gone into the red, to the tune of £50 or £84 depending who you believe, and the Executive agreed to propose an increase in subscription from £4.50 to £6. It's been £4.50 for a couple of years. The SCCU Grading List made a profit of £1266, helped maybe by the much publicised inaccuracy of the BCF one. ("But I can't guarantee similar inaccuracies next time." - "Don't worry, someone will.")

Weren't sure where to put this item, but since Money comes into it: the BCF Council has voted to send a delegate to the next FIDE meeting. It's in Rio. The expected cost is £1750, and the Finance Committee are to "find the money"; whether that means finding a new source of income or deciding who to plunder is unclear.

(8) British Championship: SCCU nomination. Southend this year, and Sutton last, used different rules for determining the free place. Briefly, Sutton gave it to the highest-placed eligible player irrespective of Union affiliation; Southend gave first bite to the SCCU Champion (automatically an SCCU player) and allowed it to go outside the Union only if he was already qualified. Don't know whether it made any difference in practice; the SCCU Champion, and nominee, did not win the event this year, but the "foreigner" who did may have been qualified already. No decision was taken, but it was felt that we ought to be consistent. For what it's worth, the Bulletin thinks Sutton were right.

(9) World Championship. "World Championship", sorry. Your Editor is already bored with this, but it's nowhere near its half-life yet. The BCF Council meeting of 24th April decided (informally, since it was a finance meeting and the World Championship wasn't on the agenda) that the Federation should not be officially involved in attempts to capitalise on the publicity; though vigorous efforts by individuals would be welcome. This feeling was unambiguous and was supported by a large majority. At any rate, two Executive members who had been present were quite clear on this and quoted the minutes in support, though a third disputed it. The Third actually wanted the SCCU to "requisition" an extraordinary BCF Council meeting to determine exactly what the policy was supposed to be. (Another Union would have to support us, and he was working on that.) He got no seconder, and someone remarked that calling a Council meeting would be the surest way of getting nothing done.

We understand that FIDE have privately given the nod to English publicity exploitation so long as it's unofficial. Oh, and Council has reinstated Adam Black as Publicity Director. Apparently this doesn't mean that Council thinks his suspension was wrong in the first place; simply that "circumstances have changed". Like, no one else has volunteered to do the job.

(10) <u>SCCU FIDE-rated tournament</u>. The Executive warmly accepted an offer by David Sedgwick to organise one at Haverstock School, subject to things like affordable rent. He would be entitled to the first f250 of any surplus, but in return would undertake to make good any deficit. Proposed dates: 16-19 August 1993. This item, being productive, naturally took far less time than the previous one.

(11) <u>SCCU County matches 1993-4</u>. There were various suggestions for change. Some felt that the Championship should be split regionally; some wanted to introduce U200 and U100 competitions; and some wanted to tidy up the rules about the number of boards. On the first and second counts it was decided to leave things as they are, at least for another year. The third got caught up in the same decision, whether by accident or design where not sure.

(12) <u>Game Fee</u>. Don't worry, not a lot was said. But someone felt quite strongly that the rules should provide an incentive for events to find their own grader. Very few do at present.

BCF MANAGEMENT BOARD

The Board met on Sunday 16th May 1993. Nothing much seems to have happened except for a bad-tempered discussion of the "World Championship" and Adam Black's role in it. He has, apparently, referred publicly to the "World Championship" as the World Championship, and the MB objected to that. A resolution was passed to the effect that all public references to the event by BCF officers should be cleared by the Chairman or President, and Adam Black said get lost. He asked for a special Council Meeting to clarify his position, and the MB said get lost. The MB will now officially call the affair the "Times Kasparov-Short match" and Adam Black will call it whatever he damn well likes. A proposal to take action (what?) against ND Short for bringing the game into disrepute was rejected. When it came to discussing the activities that might be organised around the match, the MB delegated everything to its Think Tank (ADM, JP, SDB, SWR and PW). That's about it, really. Except that the Player of the Year award (nominations close soon) is clearly going ND Short's way. That's supposed to be confidential but has already been leaked by an SCCU Officer.

Editor's Postscript.

An alternative version of this report, twelve or thirteen times as long, has been prepared by BH Birchall who was present as an observer. I won't publish it. Nor, despite his request, will I publish his lengthy (and unseconded) SCCU motion to call for an extraordinary BCF Council Meeting. But in deference to his view that "readers must be informed of all this", I'll take it on myself to try and summarise his position. He thinks the MB lack vision. He believes that the ECF's April Council Meeting (see Executive Report, item 9) expressed a clear wish that the BCF should <u>officially</u> exploit the K & S match; and that those who deny this are subverting the role of Council. He maintains that Adam Black's right to act independently is enshrined in the Constitution. He sympathises with a well known organiser's view that, "with the present MB mood", exploitation in September and October will best be done privately (which is what the MB want); but he feels that as a matter of principle it should not be left there. He deplores the BCF's failure (so far) to re-write the Constitution defining the rights of Direct Members and fee-paying leagues and congresses; so that it is hard, or impossible, for DMs to get motions onto Council agendas or call for extraordinary Council Meetings.

I hope Bruce will not think my summary unfair. He will certainly think it too short. If it's wrong I will publish his correction, but on three conditions: (1) no personalities; (2) biblical references to be kept to a minimum; and (3) maximum 200 words (my version's 147). Precis concentrates the mind wonderfully.

There appears to be a group of people in London who think all important matches should be played in London... We will become as big a focus for derision as boxing...

Letter to the Editor:

In response to Lester Millin's view [at SCCU Executive meeting] that juniors should be encouraged to have nothing to do with activities organised around the Short/Kasparov match, I would observe: (1) arguments between FIDE and the PCA, and the power struggles thin the BCF, have little interest for the public. What they will see is huge blicity for chess... The dream that they will be the next Nigel (or Nigella) Short will be a powerful factor. Our role is to respond to and orchestrate this enthusiasm. It doesn't really matter what the event is called... (2) The boycott mentality is far too rife. FIDE want to strip the rebels of their ratings to stop them being invited to tournaments (surely a restraint of trade?); the BCF President hints that Short will be removed from being an England selector ... Why this authoritarian need to punish? Why spread this contagion to juniors? Where is the boundary to be drawn? Are we to ban the "Times" Schools Championship because of its association with the sponsor?... (3) There is no parallel between Short's dilemna and people dropping out of tournaments. Children don't drop out of events because the fee's inadequate. They drop out because they're losing, and what they need then is encouragement ...

REVIEW

SHORT by Andrew Martin, Jonathan Tisdall and Richard O'Brien. 11.95 paperback. 193 pp if you believe the page numbers, but you have to count the front cover as pages 1 and 2. Published by Tournament Chess, Brighton.

Nigel Short isn't the flavour of the month in Southview Rd. The last time I reviewed a book on him (in 1981 when he was 16) I thought it premature but said you could "hardly blame the publishers for knowing which side their bread's buttered". This publisher may have timed it wrong. The earlier book, being written by Short's father, was presumably "authorised". This one presumably isn't: there's no input from Short and the (drab and mostly uncaptioned) photos are media-like and impersonal.

The book is divided into three parts, and they've been scholarly enough to say who wrote which bit. Also careless enough, on page 61, to confuse. The first part (58 pages) is a biographical survey by Richard O'Brien. It's pretty anonymous and no more than workmanlike with the research. His style grates sometimes but he writes with some hunour and the provocative remarks are fun. (Only why is the first Fischer-Spassky match infamous?) The section on political in-fighting, which could have been interesting, is tantalisingly brief; even the formation of the PCA gets cursory treatment. The second part (20 pp: Jonathan Tisdall) analyses the development of Short's playing style and opening repertoire. The third (60 pp: Andrew Martin) is dP in-depth analysis of eight Short games 1986-1993 and I'm not qualified to assess it. There is also a complete, and more or less unannotated, record of his games in the last Candidates tournament. I buy few chess books these days so can't comment on value for noney.
