EDITORIAL

Not so much an Editorial as an apology, in case this issue is strewn with infelicities and misprints. Parts of it have been put together in a hurry. But I have had the printer fixed.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive met on Friday 3rd September 1993 at Tavistocks near Paddington Station. The advantage of this venue is that it has a bar, though your Editor still owes Tony Suttill a pint. The disadvantage is the 2-watt lighting. Fifteen attended. It was a boring meeting on the whole, consisting largely of Officers Reports on which no action was required or possible. You are getting this information in a more appropriate way (on paper, through the post) and if you still find it boring you have a remedy. (1) <u>European Club Cup</u> is now revamped, with 7 groups of 8 teams playing preliminary knock-outs (including one hosted by Barbican which is already over as you read this, and we hear they got overrun in the first round). The 7 qualifiers join Hilversum in a Final event to be held there on a date to be fixed. The notional 57 teams is probably more like 50 because of gaps and/or withdrawals.

(2) <u>National League</u> has 6 teams: Barbican; Covent Garden (don't know who they are); Invicta Knights (formerly Maidstone); Slough; Bristol; and North West (which may or may not be the name they're actually going under). You will remember that they hoped for many more teams than 6; but it's a start. It is a professional league and the players will be paid. "Until the money runs out", as someone said.

(3) London Chess Festival (was to be "Times" but the money went away; hope this is ght) has included various events which it would be vexatious to list. Ticket prices for the Championship itself tumbled after the original takeup was something like 800 tickets out of 27,000 printed.

(4) First SCCU International Tournament had picked up to 41 players after a slow start; the modest financial loss will be borne by DR Sedgwick in accordance with his original suggestion. 14 rated players had taken part, 10 had achieved part ratings, and the winner was IM Varugeesi Koshy (India) who picked up lots of rating points but then went and dropped them again at the Lloyds Bank. The players had expressed a wish that the event should be held again at the same time next year.
(5) Grading. No particular problems with the BCF List this year and our sales so far

(5) <u>Grading</u>. No particular problems with the BCF List this year and our sales so far are about the same as last year. But the BCF's computer, exhausted with its efforts, keeled over and died soon after producing the list. It was beyond economic repair and will no doubt have been replaced by the time you read this. The Bulletin does not know what sort of computer it was but believes that the cost may have been something under fl000. The delay to the SCCU list was not due to this but to illness at the printer's. The Herts and Surrey lists also escaped. The Kent one, however, was still inside the computer when it died. (We do not mean this literally. We have no doubt that all grading data is still safely on disc with nineteen backups.)

Results from the Hillingdon League were submitted far too late to get into the List, the BCF has since accepted them and recalculated players' grades accordingly. The new grades may affect players' eligibility for county teams. They are not likely to be available until late October, by which time the matches will already have started. One member of the Executive doubted whether we should accept the corrections for SCCU qualifying purposes, but the majority thought we more or less had to since the BCF had accepted the results. Lists of corrections will be sent to match captains, and uncorrected grades will naturally apply until then.

One or two oddities. Ruth Bates of Richmond Juniors, who should have been somewhere round 119, came out as 24 (twenty-four) because of a typing error: an event went in as 56 games rather than 6, or something like that. (How on earth did the computer not notice?) And Jody Shuttlewood of Bourne End is listed, in the introductory pages, among the Top Twenty U18 Girls. He's a boy. Jody Saunders of Crowthorne, who isn't, is omitted. We have no information on the sex of the other Jody in the Girls list, nor on the spelling of his/her surname (different in the body of the List). The omission of Ruth Bates is regrettable but understandable. We have not been able to find a Top Twenty Women list with Glynne Jones in.

New grading is being held up somewhat because Martin Cath can't get a list of registered events out of the BCF. They hope to sort it out by the end of September. Unregistered events, of course, don't qualify for grading and no grader is going to do an event on the off chance it may turn out to be registered. (Definitive grading cannot be done anyway until the Master List appears, but much preliminary work is possible.) (6) <u>Grade-riggers</u>. Still about grading, but it was time we had a new heading. Roger Edwards, National Grading Director, is relinquishing his Management Board post but will not be replaced because he intends to continue the job without it. The Executive has learned, through unofficial channels, that he has declared war on the grade-riggers. That is, people who throw games in order to stay Under X. Some games identified as thrown have not been graded this year. We understand that eight players or thereabouts,

throughout England, have got done. There was some feeling, on the Executive, that such a policy ought not to be implemented on the quiet (as it seems to have been).

The Bulletin agrees. It has every sympathy with the policy but wonders how it can be operated fairly. However sure a congress organiser is that someone's thrown games, he won't be able to prove it. Even if the policy can be operated fairly, has it been? If we're going to do it, then for consistency's sake all congress organisers must be told, and all must co-operate by reporting offenders. Players will have to know. A black list will emerge, officially or otherwise. (Unofficially we imagine it's already in circulation.) The riggers won't stop, but they'll have to get more subtle about it and remaining Under-X will be that much harder. The black list will have to be published, along with details of games not graded. Whoops. But if you succumb to the temptation to do everything on the quiet, the policy will lack teeth and be neither fair nor consistent.

This year's eight players, if it is eight, should be named. This comment, plus all of the preceding paragraph, is of course a hidden Editorial. Normal service will now be resumed.

(7) <u>Cadogan Master Points</u>. The SCCU List looks very like the BCF one because it has the same Cadogan front cover (and the same advertisement on the back). Another Cadogan innovation is the Master Points system. To give you an example: the Bulletin, were it a BCF Direct Member, would on past form be able to qualify as a County Master. It thinks this is a devaluation of the word Master, and at least one member of the Executive made a similar comment. The BCF mooted a Master Points system about three years ago but dropped it after a consultation exercise revealed little interest. The new system appears ill thought-out in some respects. For example, players submit forms detailing their results in a particular event. Each form must be validated by an official. If the official is a congress organiser in the throes of packing equipment away, his answis all too predictable. Even at leisure it would be a time-consuming job. Then 80% of your opponents must have "established British grades". Which includes Welsh and Scottish ones, clearly, but what's an established grade? And events (5 required) must be over a period of not more than 5 years, but it's not clear whether you can backdate them to 1988. The BCF Management Board has spent little time on these questions, in meetings at any rate.

(8) <u>Game Fee</u>. The BCF September Council Meeting has to set the fee. The sum originally quoted was 20p per player per game, and R Brown intends to propose this though he thinks it's cutting it a bit fine. Lack of information makes the decision rather hit-and-miss anyway. Quite a lot of "independent" events have come in already, including some from disaffiliated counties, and it is understood that all but two of the congresses in the BCF calendar intend to register. But plenty of counties have not registered their events yet, and this hampers planning. They get free registration in the pilot year, apart from their congresses, but the BCF badly needs their figures. It has been stated that if they do not register they will not qualify for grading, even though it would have been free. This might be hard to implement, but the Bulletin and everyone else in sight urges them most strongly to get their skates on.

It is probably not true that the BCF Management Board is to be supplemented by a Game Fee Director. (But see next page...)

(9) <u>BCF Qualifying places</u>. The Bulletin had a letter from George Smith last time urging that the paid entry which goes with the qualifying place should turn into an SCCU Championship prize. The Bulletin made sympathetic noises and found itself invited, at the Executive meeting, to turn them into a proposal. So it did, and got no seconder. However, an anomaly was removed by a resolution to give the nomination to the highest-placed player not already qualified, and the paid entry to the highest-placed player not already not already having one.

player not already having one. Maidstone would still like to get into the Cartel but said they would "shut up for another year". Each Union has three places in its gift and it seemed reasonable that the SCCU, as the biggest Union, should have more. We would take this up with the BCF. (10) <u>SCCU County Matches</u>. Bucks had withdrawn from the Open, which was the only division they were in. They would find it difficult to field a full 20-board team. They do, of course, have two teams in the Chiltern League (which is over 20 boards but at a lower playing level). It was agreed to write to Bucks to see if they might be interested in SCCU matches at (say) U175 or U125 next year. All other entries, including the Kent fifth team, looked to be firm except for the Surrey U125 team which would have to withdraw if it did not find a captain. (The Oxon U125 captain had turned out to be "grossly overgraded" so couldn't play, but the team would compete.)

The Fixtures Secretary said he would try to insist on earlier entries next year. This year's fixtures had been re-done half a dozen times because of late entries. It was agreed that very late entries were undesirable; however, it was not always possible for a county to be sure it had a match captain until the Grading List came out so things would inevitably be provisional until early August.

Sussex in the U175 are unwilling to go above 16 boards. Someone asked whether this meant other counties were not allowed to, and the answer had to be yes. Friendlies apart, obviously.

Someone else asked whether Cambs pay the full levy to both SCCU and EACU. They do.

(11) <u>Juniors</u>. Not very much here, but please note that the deadline for BCET awards to schools has been changed to the end of February (was March). Nominations to BH Birchall. The SCCU Juniors v Seniors match is set to become an annual fixture.

(12) <u>Presidents Award</u> for services to chess: one of the three recipients this year is AJ (Jeff) Douglas of Surrey, formerly Kent, who as you know runs the Counties Championship at the BCF level. In fact there were only two recipients because one declined the award "for personal reasons".

(13) <u>BCF Jobs</u>. Bryan Fewell is not to seek re-election at Home Chess and Services (we know it's called something different now but don't like the new title). David Jarrett is willing to come out of retirement to fill the gap. Bruce Birchall is to stand as BCF President against AD Martin.

(14) <u>Trophies</u>. Nearly forgot this one. Tony Suttill produced some, nicely valued and engraved, and they were (re-)presented. Some Trophies had never been handed back in the first place, and yet others have been missing for years. One of them was stated to be kept under Fred Manning's bed, for purposes unspecified, but as this was before he arrived he was not asked for confirmation.

(15) <u>Meetings</u>. The Executive will meet on the 25th March and 13th May 1994 and Council on the 25th June. There was some discussion of venues for Executive meetings. The Friends House had been unavailable this time and would continue to be so on the first Friday of each month. However, at £36 it was cheaper than Tavistocks (£50) and the Free Church Federation HQ (£66). It was agreed to stick to the Quakers.

The meeting lasted two and three-quarter hours. Tavistocks has a later chucking-out time than the Friends House but this is not necessarily an advantage. <u>Correction</u> to an item from last time: the SCCU's budgeted surplus for grading 1993-4 is £360, not £1350. (That was the budgeted income.)

BCF COUNCIL MEETING 15.9.93

Briefly, from two differents accounts received: the meeting was "depleted by late arrivals and early departures because of the inaccessibility of the venue chosen". (Well, one account says that, neither says where it was, and the Bulletin hasn't the energy to check. But see page 8.) The business was something like this: (1) Club of the Year. No applications.

(2) <u>Management Board</u>. The MB Chairmanship was established as a post directly elected by Council, the Grading Director is now just an Officer (at his own wish), and a proposal to downgrade the Publicity Director in the same way was defeated. There is no Publicity Officer. (Adam Black, who resigned some time ago, said he was willing to stand if anyone proposed him, but no one did.) In a determined effort not to streamline the MB, they created a new post of Game Fee Director; there is a volunteer from the Midlands but the post will be advertised. David Jarrett comes out of retirement to sort of replace Bryan Fewell as Director of Whatever It Is; BAF will continue to do much of the work. David Newell was, as expected, elected Junior Director. Jane Seymour replaces Lady Milner-Barry as Womens Director. And there was a contested election for President between AD Martin and BH Birchall: ADM 48, BHB 2, abstentions 12.

<u>Game fee</u> was set at 20p per player per game (QP 5p) for the first full year of implementation.

(4) Inter-County Championships 1994-5. The U125 (currently 12 boards) will go up to 16 in the BCF stage. In any of the competitions a Union will only get one nomination, instead of two, unless it holds a qualifying event with at least three eligible entrants. We guess that's aimed at the Northern Counties. And the woman-count rule has gone; apparently someone tried to give it first priority before board count, and when that failed someone (?else) successfully proposed its complete abolition.

(5) FIDE. Someone wanted our FIDE delegate mandated to oppose the re-election of Campomanes at the first opportunity. As that is not until November 1994 the matter was put off till a later meeting. For this year, David Jarrett was re-elected FIDE delegate. It was reported that the Omani prize money for Karpov-Timman had evaporated (we knew that) and that there is no Dutch prize money (we didn't know that).
(6) <u>BCF Council Meetings</u> are intended to move around the country more in future, and the next one is to be in Bristol.

A MESSAGE TO MATCH CAPTAINS

<u>Please</u> send copies of all your result sheets to the Bulletin for publication. Don't rely on your opponents to do it, they may not. There's usually one or three that are less than regular. An asterisk by a county's name will show that the result has been received from that side.

Try to be legible, spell players' names right, and give full initials. Giving mess exactly as in the grading list is helpful, unless the grading list has "J Smith" and you can do better. (But if you do, say who it is.)

It is important that all matches be published in full. Partly because the grader works from the Bulletin, partly because match captains need to see what's going on, and partly just for news value. And remember that the Tournament Secretary does not police the eligibility rules, he leaves it to match captains to pick up any apparent' infractions and report to him.

Apart from the grading limit the only restrictions on eligibility are County qualification, by birth or otherwise, and the rule that says you can't play for more than one county no matter how many you were born in. And the two Kent U125 teams will be kept separate. (Not sure whether anyone's officially said so, but we have it from one of the match captains. Really it needs to be established at the start of the season if both teams are to be allowed to proceed to the BCF stage.)

Please inform the Bulletin of any changed dates, and tell us about any mistakes that slip through. They may be due to match captains' errors or illegibility, but the Bulletin is not itself infallible. All errors notified will be corrected in the next issue. With a rude remark, of course, if the error was your opponents' and you never sent the result in the first place. We draw the line at correcting mistakes in ChessMoves when you sent the result to them and not us.

<u>New players</u>. It helps very much if you send a list of all likely players who are new to your county teams (and update it as necessary during the season). Several match captains did this last season. The list will be published, largely (but not only) for the grader's benefit. One of the grader's biggest nightmares is the identification of new players. You may know that D Duck has just moved to the South-East for his health and is the same player as D Duck of Halifax, but the grader won't know unless you tell nim. He can't just take it for granted, either. To be honest some graders sometimes

do, to judge from the occasional mishaps where two different players from quite different parts of the country get confused with each other and merged in the grading list. But a cautious grader will err the other way and Mr Duck will get two different grades, to his annoyance and the BCF's inconvenience.

Give BCF grading reference numbers where possible, but even so you should say where the player's from. Be as informative as possible, even if the player isn't in the grading list at all. He could well be in the graders' (private) master list.

Birmingham. Our third informant says so. He also adds one or two new items. In particular, "There was one substantive motion to reverse a change that Stewart Reuben had introduced to the National Club rules to award a tied 5 board match to the team with 3 blacks instead of using the old board-count system. This motion was carried; a decision that was very clearly not to Stewart's liking." SWR's change was news to us; the way we heard it (see Bulletin 209:3) he changed it so that in 5-board matches board count was abolished and bottom board elimination was applied immediately. This would have made little difference in practice. If the change was indeed as quoted by our informant, we approve it belatedly and would have joined SWR in regretting its reversal. Board count and elimination are arbitrary, but the disadvantage of having three blacks is real. A wider selection than usual, and for a change some of them are meant to be taken seriously. You have to guess which.
