#### SCCU EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive met on Friday 13th May 1994 at the Friends House near Euston Station. 18 attended - more than average - and your Editor managed to make it this time.

(1) <u>Haverstock School</u>. The School, and we could have said it last time if we'd known, seems to have been less than punctilious in answering letters over the last few months. This has caused uncertainty over their intended letting fees for SOCU (and Middx) events. The current situation is that a cheque for £700 has been sent jointly by Middx and the SCCU (SCCU share £520), offered in full and final settlement for all this season's events. This would work out rather more expensive than last year's lettings, but nowhere near the figure the School had demanded. Since the cheque was very promptly banked, it is the Union's guess that the offer has been accepted.

A Girls event on the 11th June, not included in the deal, is going to cost us and the BWCA f130 jointly. A suggestion that we should therefore not hold it was not

pursued.

(2) <u>Grading</u>. We reported last time that someone's games from a Hastings tournament would not be graded because he was thought not to have been trying very hard. The original complaint had come from the chief congress organiser. Though no one suggested reversing the decision, there was general unease about doing this sort of thing on the quiet. The player should at least be told and given a chance to speak for himself, and the policy should be clearly announced to players and organisers. This particular player knows what's happened, though the Union didn't tell him. It should have. Our report in the last issue "hid" his identity behind a transparent pseudonym and your Editor apologises to him personally, if he's reading this, for not telling him himself.

(3) <u>BCF matters</u>. Briefly: (a) there is a new Finance Director (Ray Clark). (b) the year Book is to be produced, and financially backed, by Batsfords. The Executive peculated that this could lead to a more professional approach and a more up-to-date content. And (c) there is a dispute between the BCF and RW O'Brien, who contends that the Federation does not always give congress bookstall concessions to the highest bidder. We understand that feelings have run high over this one. We won't attempt to give details, partly because we're far from clear on them. Oh, and (d) the BCF President, unless we dreamed it, is unable to attend the SCCU Council Meeting on the 25th June and a suggestion to invite his deputy was not pursued. (Later: we must have dreamed it, or it was hypothetical, or something. See Letters page 4.)

(4) SCCU U100 Jamboree. This is to go ahead on Sunday 5th June at Ashford Kent. We believe that Middx, Essex, Bucks and Herts are interested and Kent are deciding how

many teams to enter.

(5) Menchik event. CI Howell is working on this and hopes to arrange some kind of commemorative event, Novemberish, probably in Kent (Menchik's county). We have no details but a mens v womens team event, with norms available, has been spoken of.

(6) Money. The Treasurer produced his draft accounts, showing a deficit of £875. It was agreed to propose to Council on the 25th June that the team entry fee should go

up from £6s to £10.

(7) Rules. The Rules and Appeals sub-committee intends to consider various things, ot sure what but appeals and complaints procedures may come into it. They may make proposals for rule changes at the Council meeting on the 25th June. (There, now we've

told you three times. Formal notice will naturally go out in due course.)

(8) Sutton Congress 1994. It has been alleged that blows were struck, or exchanged, on two occasions during the congress. A congress official is involved. Deficiencies have also been alleged in the congress's appeals procedures following an accusation of cheating. We cannot give more detail because legal action has been threatened, we believe by at least two parties to the dispute. The Executive confirmed a proposal to ask David Welch, BCF Chief Arbiter, to conduct a formal investigation; provided that the cost to the Union should not be more than floo. (Later note: it won't be.) It is understood that an investigation by Mr Welch would be acceptable to all parties, and had actually been requested by one of them. Some wondered whether an investigation ought to be the Union's financial responsibility, considering that the Sutton Congress is not run by the Union (and did not, this year, host the Union Championship).

The meeting lasted two and a quarter hours, the most you can fit in given a 9.30 chucking-out time, and one or two items got squeezed out of the agenda. The BCF And The Grass Roots, to your Editor's relief, was one of them.

TWO OPEN LETTERS

(or, more precisely, two letters privately exchanged but published at the invitation of both parties)

To DR Sedgwick, President, Southern Counties Chess Union: Dear Mr Sedgwick,

21.4.94

I write about the recent Oxon-Sussex dispute and the manner and substance of the Appeals Sub-Committee's deliberations on the matter. The committee of the Oxon CCA met on Friday 15th April 1994 to discuss this and other issues.

We were dismayed to learn that the outcome of the Appeal had been determined, not

by a meeting of the Sub-Committee, but - somehow - over the telephone. How the SCCU could be happy to adopt such an obviously sub-standard method, which allows for no proper discussion, and which could admit the charge that the matter was being handled casually, was beyond us.

We felt, too, that item 8 of the Sub-Committee's statement effectively upheld the Oxon appeal and that a penalty should therefore have been imposed. As it turned out, a points penalty against Sussex would have meant that Kent would have won the Open

Championship, so the issue was not merely parochial.

On the question of the quality of evidence received, we appreciate the criticisms made by Mr Welch and Mr Reuben. We had already expressed concern amongst ourselves about the written comments made by Mr Nicholas on the dispute, which we felt contained a number of contentious passages, and we note that this document is not mentioned in the Statement.

Finally, we were convinced that readers of the March 1994 SCCU Bulletin would have believed that the Appeals Sub-Committee had actually met to resolve the dispute. Whilst we fully understand that Mr Hadrell's role is to report and comment on what does happen, rather than what does not, we are sure that he equally understands that there are occasions (the dog that did nothing in the night, there being no meeting) where what doesn't happen is the crucial thing.

This business has led to a good deal of unhappiness in Oxfordshire and I shoud be pleased to receive any comments that you might like to make. I am sending a copy of this letter to the Bulletin, and I would ask you to sanction its publication there, if Mr Haddrell wants to print it. We would of course be happy for your reply to appear

with it.

## OXFORDSHIRE-SUSSEX DISPUTE

Thank you for your letter of 21st April concerning the above.

At the SCCU Executive Committee meeting on 3rd July 1993, at which Sub-Committees were appointed, the Executive accepted a recommendation from me that the Rules and Appeals Sub-Committee should comprise five people (rather than three as hitherto) and that the members should all come from different counties. My intention was to ensure that, barring exceptional circumstances, there would always be a nucleus competent to consider any dispute. Subsequent events lead me to believe that that decision, at least, was correct. However, I think that a body of five, widely dispersed and with business to consider only on rare and unpredictable occasions, is not necessarily going to find it practicable to proceed solely by way of meetings. My recollection is that the Executive took account of this at the time. Now that the issue has been raised, I will ask the Sub-Committee to review the matter at the meeting mentioned in Point 14 of the Statement. I am inclined to think, however, that any requirement to the effect that the Sub-Committee must always actually meet to resolve disputes may prelude the inclusion amongst the members of pesons from the more outlying counties, such as Oxfordshire.

The second paragraph of your letter could be taken to imply that your county had no knowledge of the proposed procedure prior to its implementation. This is certainly not the case. On 10th February, over two weeks before I referred the dispute to the Sub-Committee for decision, I wrote to Mr FC Manning (the tournament controller), Mr P Watson (the Sussex captain), and Mr JN Stayt (the Oxfordshire captain). In each letter I included the sentence "I anticipate that written or telephone contact amongst the members will prove to be a more efficient way of dealing with the matter than a formal meeting.". Each of the recipients was invited to contact me with any comments or queries; none of them did. If Oxfordshire regard the procedure adopted as "obviously sub-standard" and unacceptable, I consider that it was incumbent on Mr Stayt to have so indicated at that time. In the absence of any such comment, I think that I was entitled to conclude that it was not an aspect in respect of which your county had any objection. Moreover, I am quite satisfied that - apart from Mr Metcalfe, who was precluded from any involvement - all members of the Sub-Committee gave full and proper consideration to the issues and are entitled to be affronted by any suggestion to the contrary. I personally devoted a great deal of time and attention to the dispute, undoubtedly more than would have been necessary had a meeting been held. I consider it . most unlikely that a different procedure would have had any effect on the outcome.

You suggest that readers of the Statement will have been misled on this aspect. I certainly had no intention of giving any incorrect impression. The point was not in y mind when drafting the statement, as I was quite unaware of any concern in this connection until I received your letter. Where criticisms had been made, I sought to reflect them in the Statement - Point 13 was included entirely on my own initiative.

Your comments concerning Mr Haddrell and the Bulletin strike me as somewhat cryptic and I am not sure whether you are criticising him for failing to comment or me for not

allowing him to do so. If the latter, let me put the record straight. I have no power to gag him — only the full Executive can do that. On occasion he and I do discuss, or correspond about, actual or intended comments and we have done so in connection with the dispute. However, I have not suggested that he should refrain from criticising the Sub-Committee's procedure — I would have had no reason to do so, as it was not previously at issue. As you have requested that this correspondence be made public, I am writing to Mr Haddrell inviting him to publish your letter and this reply, and to make such editorial comments as he sees fit. Since he has already given considerable coverage to the dispute, I am not sure whether he will wish to make more space available. I am therefore sending copies of the correspondence to the SCCU Executive and I would be grateful if you would circulate it to your Committee.

I turn next to the substantive question. You do not appear to be making any criticism of my decision to seek the guidance of Messrs Welch and Reuben. Both were quite clear that, in the words of Mr Reuben in his letter to the Bulletin, "..it is up to the Appeal Committee what action, if any, they should take.". Options mooted included the following: awarding the match to Oxfordshire; ordering that the match be replayed (a suggestion which I rejected as impracticable); making a deduction of one game point from the Sussex score (the principal alternative, mentioned in Point 10 of the Statement); making a deduction of half a game point (which would of course have been purely symbolic); issuing a warning (the actual decision); or no action at all. It is a matter of opinion whether the Sub-Committee's decision was right or wrong. I can discern no grounds for your suggestion that the decision was one which it was not open to the Sub-Committee to reach.

Mr Nicholas's written comments were sent to me by Mr Watson as part of the latter's submission, mentioned in Point 4 of the Statement. It is surely evident from Point 8 the Statement, and also from Point 7, that the Sub-Committee, on advice, rejected the bulk of Mr Nicholas's contentions. On factual aspects, there are some differences of emphasis between Mr Nicholas's account and that given by Mr Stayt, but these were not such as to lead any member of the Sub-Committee to request me to seek clarification or additional evidence. Personally, I found the comments of Mr Nicholas helpful as: they appear to confirm a key point emphasised by Mr Stayt, namely that Mr Nicholas's actions had given rise to a rapid protest from a number of members of the Oxfordshire side.

On the overall quality of the evidence, and on some other aspects, there are indeed valid criticisms, as indicated in Point 13 of the Statement. The whole matter has been the subject of a great deal of discussion and more then one rumour. However, nothing that I have heard would, even if substantiated, lead me to believe that the Sub-Committee's decision was in any way incorrect.

I regard it as most unfortunate that the controversy surrounding the dispute has tended to overshadow the splendid achievement of Sussex in winning the SCCU Counties Championship for the first time since 1921.

d: - I refrained from comment last time because it was held in some quarters that I'd already done enough damage by commenting the time before. I'll comment now, though. I said nothing about the telephonic nature of the decision because it didn't strike me as controversial. (No, I certainly wasn't gagged!) But it is true that a vital part of the decision (what penalty to impose) was taken by a majority vote, and I hope the procedure went beyond a simple head-count-by-telephone: it was important that the minority - of one, presumably - should have every opportunity of impressing its view on the majority. But there's no obvious reason why a telephonic decision should preclude discussion, if it's properly done.

I was more worried about the other part of the decision. The sub-committee upheld the game result because "..it appeared to us on the evidence before us that no protest had been made by Mr Rose himself". The concern is the evidence that wasn't before them. You will recall that no statements were taken from the players. Mr Rose's exact position, unfortunately, wasn't very clear. To me at any rate, and I think the sub-committee was no wiser. The point was critical.

I regard Mr Sedgwick's last paragraph as unfortunate! How could Sussex's achievement not be overshadowed by the controversy? If their bystander had not broken the rules it is entirely possible that they would not have beaten Oxfordshire, nor won the Championship. This isn't a partisan whinge, just a response to what seems to me to be a silly remark. Funny things happen in leagues. I wish the Sussex team well and I'd be backing them if Kent weren't still in it, and unprovoked I'd have held my tongue.

#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

I had not realised that Stewart Reuben was to blame for the introduction of Quickplay finishes. These are necessary perhaps to enable congresses to fit in three rounds in a day and should in my view be restricted to that purpose, for with QP finishes, as

opposed to adjournments, one never gets experience of playing endgames, except ludicrously quickly and inaccurately. Spending four hours to get a won ending only to ruin it in the last five minutes is unsatisfactory, whilst winning due to an opponent's blunder is hardly pleasurable either (though better than the former!). I should much prefer a rapid but finite QP - 20 moves in 10 minutes or 30 in 15, say; on reaching that control a further identical period to ensue.

However, the reason I am writing is to challenge two other views expressed in Stewart's letter. He suggests an Arbiter should not step in to announce a time forfeit. As Stewart in effect points out, an Arbiter must be present to prevent spectators drawing attention to a flag-fall. Must the Arbiter, having carefully kept count of how many moves have been made, abstain from declaring the loss for the player ge sees exceed the time limit? Despite Stewart's three superior titles, I am not afraid to say he is wrong.

As to suggesting the Laws of Chess. Quickplay Finish, Rapidplay and 5-minute should all be as similar as possible, it was that kind of thinking that led to my not renewing my membership of the (independent) Arbiters' Association. The first game is chess, the second an artificial way of finishing a game quickly, the third and fourth "fun" games as a change from serious chess. There is no earthly reason why the rules should be as similar as possible.

Finally, I recently had occasion to show Stewart a copy of the 1931 Laws in a wartime edition measuring about  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " by 2.75" [Ed: sorry about the decimal fraction but my print wheel's not that vulgar] and priced 6d  $(2\frac{1}{2}p$  in today's currency) and it was so clear that a child could pick it up and teach him-or-herself to play chess. Maidstone are up in arms about their loss on board count in the Open. The match was played by telephone. The Dundee arbiter turned up three-quarters of an hour late but would not accept more than 15 minutes on the Dundee clocks "because it was my fault, not theirs". Then Dundee, it is alleged, were ludicrously inefficient in their transmission of moves. Mistakes abounded, and on occasion were not discovered until long afterwards. One occurred when the Maidstone player was very short of time. The Maidstone team became more and more angry as their games were turned into nonsenses by the Dundee officials. Or official; transmission was so slow that Maidstone suspected one person was doing the job single-handed. A Maidstone player, on one occasion, thought his opponent's move was so long in coming that he asked for confirmation that he really hadn't moved yet. Reply: "No, he's still thinking about it." Then some time later: "Oh, sorry, we seem to have lost your last move. Could you give it us again?" Some of the Maidstone players were for calling a halt to it (and claiming, presumably, win on the ground of Dundee's incompetence). One, at least, got so frustrated and/or stracted that he forgot to play an intended move and lost a probably won game. Maidstone later complained to the Controller, who expressed sympathy but did not see what he could do. Neither does the Bulletin, and neither, we think, do Maidstone. With hindsight, those who wanted to call a halt were probably right.

It is at best ironic that Dundee, drawn away, had insisted on their right to a

telephone match despite Maidstone's offer of a half-way venue.

Apart from the issue of such goings-on in the later stages of a prestigious competition, Maidstone point to the large sums of money involved. How much? Don't know, to tell the truth, but the semi-finalists all get something, and first prize is £1000. And it mattered to Maidstone because they are committed to next year's European Club Cup and were rather counting on something from the National Club. We have heard that a London club was similarly embarrassed, and angry, after getting knocked out last year in a very similar telephone match by.. Dundee & Victoria.

We must emphasise - as if it wasn't obvious - that our information comes from

Maidstone sources. We have not asked Dundee for their version.

Question on telephone matches: Player A takes a draw, confident that team mate B is winning. Then it turns out that B, through a mistake in transmission, has been playing an imaginary game for the last half hour and has to go back to a position where heisn't winning at all. The mistake was the other side's. Is A allowed to go back to be position where he took a draw and reconsider? Well, why not? And what if you can't tell whose mistake it was? Perhaps the real answer is, telephone matches oughtn't to occur in serious competition.

FOUR NATIONS CHESS LEAGUE reached its climax with the last two rounds at Maidstone on the 7th and 8th April. We can't give full details because no one's sent them, but Barbican and Invicta Knights went into the weekend in the joint lead. (We thought so anyway, but the May ChessMoves has Barbican half a match ahead. It makes no difference to our story.) Both won on the Saturday (Barbican  $7\frac{1}{2}$  Northwest Eagles, IK 5 3 Bristol). And the script writer had done his job: last round on Sunday paired IK and Barbican together, with Barbican a mile ahead on games (we assume tie break was on game points) and the host team needing a win to take the title. Barbican won the first game to finish. It was the only game they won.

Only one untitled player in the match (and he won).

We hear the Invicta Knights team enjoyed receiving their imaginary prizes at the closing ceremony. The big disappointment of the 4NGL's first year has been the lack of

a major sponsor and the total absence of prize money. Don't know how other teams have coped, but Invicta Knights had substantial sponsorship from Kent County Council, topped up with something not at all unsubstantial from the KCCA. And, we think, contributions from one or two individuals. Plus whatever they made from the big Maidstone festival that went with the last two rounds. And still they didn't quite cover their costs, and their professional players made nothing.

A committee has been formed (C Dunworth, CI Howell, DR Sedgwick, G Kenworthy) to consider the structure of the League for next year. No doubt sponsorship will be

discussed, and we're sure they'll be looking to get more than six teams.

#### CONGRESS RESULTS

PCA BRINGS CHESS INTO THE 21st CENTURY

Unquote. The breakthrough in question is the introduction, in association with Intel, of a computerised grading system which "brings an unprecedented level of accuracy to player evaluation". To quote from their press release's Technical Information:

The calculation of performance takes into account a number [well, two's a number] of factors not previously allowed for:

1) Statistical analysis has shown that there is a quantifiable difference white and black results. The white advantage is greater at higher levels of playing strength.

2) Players have different, measurable variances. The lower the variance the more

the player tends to be solid and reliable.

To be included in the Intel World Chess Rankings, a player must in general have played over 100 games in the last three years.

The Intel World Chess Rankings will publish the top 500 players every two

months.

The new rankings have analysed games [all games?] above a certain category [which?]. If a player has performed very well on a lot of minor tournaments these will not have been taken into account and this could lead to a lower ranking. You don't say. We called that a "quote" from the Technical Information, but in fact it's the whole grudging lot. Except they give a phone number from which you can get more (of the same?).

They append an initial list for all players rated 2500 and above. They don't say how far back the calculations go (three years??). They have 290 players on 2500 and above; pity the Bulletin doesn't know the FIDE figure. But then, will comparison with FIDE figures mean anything? Is the PCA system broadly the FIDE one with refinements, or is it completely different? We wonder idly just how accurate you can, or should, y to be. "This player's recent results are awful. But we must allow for the fact that he's just lost a long match against so-and-so and the statistics show he can't play against so-and-so."

We have no idea whether the PCA's system will be a serious improvement on, or rival to, the FIDE one. Except that six times a year looks like an improvement on two. And

Kasparov (2808) and Karpov (2797) are both in it. (Short too.)

MEET THE MASTERS by Cathy Forbes: Tournament Chess, 51 Cissbury Crescent, Saltdean, Brighton BN2 8RH. 160 pages fl1.95 soft covers.

Nine interviews, all originally published elsewhere 1990-1993, with top players; plus three with chess-minded public figures and one with the author herself. And a piece, not actually an interview, covering the second Fischer-Spassky match. With the odd game, including the author's offhand one against Fischer. Ms Forbes certainly gets around. I don't buy many books of the read-it-once-and-throw-it-away sort, especially at £11.95, but this is certainly a good read. Subjects range from the nerse to the voluble and bits of political background keep intruding. The Anand

interview is recommended. (VA: "I would assume that [Short] didn't take this decision [to break with FIDE] in a fit of anger." NDS elsewhere: "The breakaway was inspired by anger.") Pity she never got to interview Fischer, but you get a vivid picture of the gangsters that wouldn't have allowed it. And would he have had anything to say?
