Prod your county treasurer, or whoever, if you think it expedient. Match captains really need to get the Bulletin, and nearly all do in fact subscribe, either directly or through their counties. A handful of people receive complimentary Bulletins, usually in exchange for their own wares or regular information, and they needn't write unless I forget.

There is also an order form for grading lists. This has to go to a different address. Don't attempt to combine Bulletin and grading list order in a single cheque. At best that makes extra work for officers and at worst it could mean part of your order getting overlooked. County secretaries are being sent lots of GL order forms,

with a request to distribute them to clubs when convenient.

SCCU ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING

Council met at 2 p.m. on Saturday 25th June 1994 at Tavistocks near Paddington station. Tavistocks is a pub, fortunately. 28 attended, if we counted right; don't know whether all counties were represented. Alan Martin, BCF President, was in attendance. What follows is, of course, the Bulletin's own version of events; the official minutes will go to counties in due course. (We use that vague expression because we don't actually know when. With the notice of next year's AGM, possibly, though that seems a bit late. The Executive will doubtless get the chance to see them before that.)

(1) Minutes of the previous AGM 3.7.93 were approved, and no matters arose.

It was confirmed that David Welch, BCF Chief Arbiter, is to (2) Sutton inquiry. conduct an inquiry into the events at Sutton, aided by two other arbiters from the The inquiry is being undertaken for the SCCU, and the BCF is not involved. Findings should be available at some time after the British Championships and the Bulletin expects to publish a summary.

(3) BCF Year Book. Batsfords, who have taken over as publishers and sponsors, propose to omit certain results (corresponding to pages 80 to 98 of the current YB). It is not clear who, if anyone, they have consulted. There was some disquiet about this. Someone said the World Cup had bum referees, a remark whose relevance the

Bulletin forgets.

(4) Menchik Memorial Tournament. Chris Howell was trying to get some BCF money for this.

(5) SCCU U180 KO. July at Stevenage. The Final, Herts v Berks, was due to be played next Saturday 2nd

 (6) SCCU Individual Championship had gone to MD Sadler.
 (7) Junior events. Most of this year's events have been fully reported in the Bulletin. However, BH Birchall mentioned an U14 Girls event, for teams of four, which had been held on the 11th June at Haverstock School. 26 teams, including seven from he WECU and four from the EACU, had taken part. Winners: Div 1 Suffolk; Div 2 Suffolk II: Div 3 Somerset II.

(8) Bulletin Editor's Report. This rarely gets a mention because it always says "Nothing to report". It did this year, by proxy at that because the Bulletin had wandered off to buy a pint, and it was astounded to hear when it got back that two

people had wanted to Ask Questions. Never found out who they were.

(9) Game Fee. JA Philpott had been encouraged by the level of registration, but

remarked that the BCF had not always been too communicative.

Ways had been proposed, and shelved, of giving Direct Members rebates on game fee in all events, up to a maximum of 20 games a year, on submission of a claim form. Council appeared sympathetic to unshelving. The Bulletin thought it sounded complicated and has not been sorry to learn, since, that the unshelving won't happen. DMs don't pay game fee in congresses anyway, assuming the congresses pass the savings on and one imagines they usually will. In leagues they pay.

R Edwards, BCF Grading Officer if that's the right title, had recommended game fee exemption for the Deaf and Blind Championships on the ground that these events were analogous to club championships. Alan Martin had rejected this because some of their

events are open, but would reconsider.

(10) <u>U150 Quarter-final</u>. Sussex raised a matter which they felt had not been satisfactorily resolved by the BCF. Their quarter-final opponents, Cumbria, had been permitted by AJ Douglas, the Controller, to field a player graded 150. He had also been allowed to play in the NCCU stage. Sussex, who lost narrowly, had complained to the BCF and requested Mr Douglas's resignation. The BCF, accepting that an error been made, had sent a formal apology to Sussex but rejected Mr Douglas's profferred resignation and expressed confidence in him. The Sussex delegates at Tavistocks repeated their conviction that the Controller should step down. AD Martin replied that he thought that unnecessary. It is understood that Sussex may raise the matter with the next BCF Council Meeting.

(11) <u>Grading</u>. Martin Cath said the SCCU list would now, like the BCF one, include the E grades (at least 1 game in the most recent year and 10 in the last three years). This might go some way towards repairing the decline in sales.

(12) Accounts. Council adopted Tony Suttill's audited accounts for 1993-4, showing a deficit of £912. The biggest upset to predictions was on grading lists, which made only £57 after a projected £360. There was no one obvious reason, though see above.

- (13) <u>Budget</u>. Tony Suttill had budgeted for another loss, of £770. Some thought this odd, but he explained that the aim was to reduce the Union's liquid assets from their current figure of £2690-odd to something like £1000. They had previously been in that area before unforeseen events had pushed them, a year or two ago, over the £3000 mark. The Union was not in the business of building up large bank accounts and he was trying to rectify the situation. After surprisingly protracted discussion, Council agreed with him nem con and the County affiliation fee to the Union was set at £25, with an entry fee of £10 for each team entered in the Union's (main) competitions. This means the Open, U175 and so on but not the U180 KO or occasional jamborees.
- (14) Address by BCF President. After its goodish start the Meeting had decelerated and Alan Martin, who had waited more than two and a quarter hours, was forced by another engagement to limit his address to little more than a couple of minutes. He spoke of the Federation's keenness to enhance the profile of chess in schools. Someone from Berkshire then addressed him at greater length on the Grass Roots, and the Bulletin went to buy another pint.

(15) The BCF and the Grass Roots. It was now 4.45 p.m. and your Editor proposed, at the Chairman's invitation(!), that this item should be deferred. It was, and the two dissenting votes came from Berkshire.

(16) Officers elected are named inside the front cover. The Equipment Officer will be appointed later when we know where the Union's principal venue is going to be.

(Equipment is with Fred Manning at the moment.) There was discussion of a new post Congress Liaison Officer which might be filled at a later date. (See page 8.)

(17) Postal chess. Someone observed that the MCCU runs postal chess, or he may

have said postal teams, so why not us? No proposal was made.

(18) Rule changes. Here goes.

(a) Principal Officers sub committee. Won't remind you what this was about, because the proposal was withdrawn when it became apparent that Council had some reservations about the draft and/or principle.

(b) Game fee. A new rule was added to the Constitution, requiring the Union's events

to be registered.

(c) Claims and appeals. It was proposed that claims of ineligibility should be made within 14 days of the match or by the 31st December, whichever was later, and that the right to claim should be restricted to the match captains of the teams playing in the match concerned. Several points arose. Firstly, what is the significance of the 31st December? Secondly, why shouldn't the captains of other interested teams be able to claim? (The draft had recognised this point.) And thirdly, shouldn't the time limit be 14 days after the match result went in the Bulletin? The thing clearly wanted further attention, and was sent back to the shop.

A 14-day time limit was adopted for all other claims and complaints, for responses to them, and for appeals. In the case of appeals, the Rules and Appeal Sub-committee is now required to meet in the flesh, rather than by telephone,

unless all parties agree otherwise.

(d) League structure. There will be a new SCCU U100 league over 12 boards. The U125 will in future be over 16 boards, for consistency with the new rule in the National stage. And where a county has two teams in a division, it will no longer be possible for anyone to play in both. (The old rules allowed it, with restrictions and disincentives; no county has ever taken advantage of the option.)
 (e) Tie-breaks. The Rules stipulate board count and elimination in KO events but do

e) <u>Tie-breaks</u>. The Rules stipulate board count and elimination in KO events but do not mention jamborees. A proposal to extend them to jamborees was withdrawn; not sure why unless it was because someone pointed out that you'd have to re-draft

saying how to apply them.

Council also made numerous small tidying-up changes, bringing the Rules into line with current practice or common sense. The new County Match Rules should be sent to all match captains before the start of the coming season. The Constitution, or General Rules to be accurate, has suffered only tidying-up changes apart from (b) above, but we expect counties will be receiving the updated version.

The Meeting closed at 6.45 p.m. and someone, not your Editor, observed that this didn't compare too well with the previous year's 5.06.

SCCU EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive had its annual post-AGM get-together. It appointed delegates to the BCF Management Board (DR Sedgwick, WA Suttill); delegates to the BCF Council (DRS, WAS, CI Howell, C Fewtrell); Rules and appeals sub-committee (DRS, NW Dennis, RCN Lee-Anderson, JA Philpott, D Metcalfe, RJ Haddrell); and the sixth member of the SCCU

Management Board (RJH). Your Editor's notes have a heading at the bottom saying "Meetings", which will have meant proposed dates for future ones. If any were proposed he didn't write them down. (He's since been told, and vaguely remembers, that the 2nd September was fixed for an Executive meeting.)

BCF EXTRAORDINARY COUNCIL MEETING Birmingham, 16th July 1994

Only 25 attended in person, not surprisingly perhaps in view of the purpose of the meeting, but another 40-odd had given proxies. The purpose of the meeting was to consider the constitutional changes prepared by Paul Buswell. Numerous amendments were proposed on the day, lots of them successfully, but still they managed to finish in three hours and ten minutes. You don't want to hear the details, except that an amendment to substitute "Chair" for "Chairman" throughout was lost when someone noticed the potentially unfortunate implications of the President taking the Chair.

There is now a Constitution Committee comprising Paul Buswell, Chris Lean, (Herts), Andrew Leadbetter (Staffs), Stan Peachey (Middx) and John Philpott (Essex); plus the President and Chairman (both currently Alan Martin) ex officio. Its first job is going

to be drafting the amendments carried on the day, or most of them.

ank you for SCCU Bulletin 217 received today. I am glad to see it is up to its usual standard of being entertaining, informative and, where necessary, controversial! I am sorry that my National Club Intermediate results, delayed by my visit to Poland with the British blind team, arrived too late for inclusion. By the way, we finished in 9th/10th place. As I am not Controller of the Open (this is well handled by my colleague Philip Clemow) I write wearing my Arbiters hat. You mention the quarter-final match in the Open played between Maidstone and Dundee & Victoria.

You mention prize money and I enclose for your info. a copy o the current rules. No. 22 sets out the prizes. [Open: £1000, £500, 2 x £250; first prizes in the other events £400, £300, £250, lower prizes in same proportions as near as dammit. Plus chess clocks for last 8 in all four competitions.] It may be that you know the Rules For Telephone Matches verbatim. If not, you may find the enclosed of interest. I wonder if at Dundee in addition to a Controller there were both Stewards and telephone operators (plural). Of course it may well be that there were all such officials. I suppose with hindsight many of these points should be checked beforehand, or at any rate you should make sure that the same set of rules will be used. Again, this may well have been done.

Sorry, but I must write a long letter. [Ed: - it's got shortened a bit, with Gary's agreement.]

Grading. Thank you for your comments, Richard. I am very concerned about kangaroo courts removing people from rating and grading lists, whether at the highest or moderate levels. Also about not grading games on hearsay without informing key individuals, including the players themselves, and blacklisting them without their knowledge, without giving a reason and without right of appeal.

Obviously, sanctions must exist for those who fraudulently enter tournaments. Offenders exist in the SCCU. They misspell their names and change initials and clubs in order to win prize money in distant events. There are several people who do rig their grades, mainly in club championships and evening leagues, in order to play the Leigh Amateur. They have to play for several clubs in order to throw the correct number of games. The correct procedure must be to challenge these people and investigate, not convict them in their absence and without their knowledge. People can be ill at a tournament and do badly - did anybody think of that reason?

Sussex-Oxon. I have been quite concerned over the handling of this matter, making a mountain out of a molehill. But reading David Sedgwick's reply to Mr Starkie, I think he made an excellent response. There have been precedents in SCCU matches. The role of match captains as arbiters has not been discussed. I would trust many match captains better than some arbiters and controllers.

Particularly irritating is your response to David Sedgwick's final paragraph. At last someone has congratulated Sussex on winning the SCCU. Bravo! Noticed at last! Well done Sussex. Still it was a sad affair and certainly scared Sussex because the judgment was so long in coming.

Eligibility. Several counties over the years have openly cheated, e.g in grading

restricted tournaments team captains have played BCF ungradeds or used the lowest of whitiple grades. Surely the player knows his grade, and I know sometimes the team captain does beforehand. Foreign students and Elo rated players are frequently used. Complaints are made. It is discussed at the SCCU AGM. Too late to do anything now. Warning given. Couple of years later, happens again. Repeat performance. Couple of years later, happens again. Repeat performance. Couple of years later, happens again. Looking forward to the 1996-7 season and its subsequent AGM? What do you do? Don't say don't grade his games, and make the matter worse. Will it appear on the agenda after Missing Trophies?

Loss on time. When drafting legislation, consider this. You are winning a won game in a QP finish, your opponent loses on time, and a "neutral" yells out about the same time as yourself, claiming the game. Are you given a loss for fairly winning a won game? How neutral is the spectator? I would be cheesed off being diddled out of my win.

National Club. Yes, Barbican were even worse treated than Maidstone by Dundee. The biggest problem was the biased arbiter, one of the most senior in the land. He came out with great ideas like, our team was not in grading order (so Dundee win). Or, it is illegal to substitute reserves in a team match once the team lists have been exchanged (so Dundee win). The repercussions were mega, and a very strong player left the club because of it. It was the hardest match ever to arrange. I could easily go on for twenty or thirty pages. We were robbed by gamesmanship. Expect a letter on pathetic arbiter work, it's getting awful.

PS Keep up the good work. The SCCU Bulletin is the most riveting read about, mainly because it deals with the issues.

Ed: - I've been called some things, but riveting's a new one. Two comments. There are procedures for complaining about ineligible players, aren't there? And penalties laid down. If you leave it till the AGM, of course it's too late. And on flag fall, aturally you don't automatically forfeit your won game just because a bystander speaks out of turn. Depends on the circumstances. In general I'd have thought you only forfeit it if there seemed a real chance that you might not have seen the flag was down before your own went. And even then I'd hesitate to do anything unless the bystander was, or appeared to be, on your side. Certainly wouldn't if he was on the other side!

One other thing, obvious enough but maybe worth saying. In a telephone match the Arbiters (officially they're called Controllers) don't represent either side and certainly can't make claims on anyone's behalf. Moreover, while they may need to rule on the Laws of Chess, they have no final say on the rules of the competition. If Dundee want to claim, say, that Barbican are playing their team in the wrong order, their complaint goes to the man who's running the tournament. I'm sure Peter Gibbs would agree with this.

Nigel Short: Olympiad

We have just heard that an Extraordinary Meeting of the BCF Management Board has been called for Sunday 7th August, at the request of the MCCU, to debate their motion that the England selectors should not consider Nigel Short for the Olympiad starting in November. We understand that Simon Brown, International Director (and chairman of the selectors) had declined to give an assurance to that effect.

The Bulletin doesn't know whether NDS would play anyway, or whether FIDE would have him. (Or how they'd grade his games.) David Sedgwick in a personal capacity comments that, while he does not agree with the MCCU, he has always respected their opinions. However, he feels that their action in convening this meeting at the last possible moment, and too late for the BCF Council to review any decision, is an abuse of proper procedure.

The selectors, for the record, are Simon Brown and Bob Wade, plus Susan Lalic for womens events and John Nunn for the rest.

Sussex-Cumbria

See page 1. It is understood that the Sussex AGM on the 9th July was dissatisfied with the BCF's actions and proposed to take matters further. Under the BCF's new constitution they can raise it in Council with the support of one other affiliate.

English Deaf Chess Association

has recently written to the SCCU asking if it can contribute to their expenses in the World Team Championships for the Deaf to be held in August. The President, having consulted the Treasurer, has replied that the Union regretfully cannot help.

4NCL, and Other Leagues

The Four Nations Chess League is losing its two strongest teams, Invicta Knights and Barbican, next year. There has not been enough money around to justify teams of their strength and it seems there is little prospect of getting more. The League is expected to continue, but maybe no team will have more than a couple of IMs and probably most will have none. (Invicta Knights may, indeed, continue to play, but not with last year's team.)

Invicta Knights have been talking informally with the French professional league and there seem good prospects of last year's 4NCL team, maybe strengthened(!), going into France in the coming season starting January. The French league had 16 teams last year, playing single-round APA. The top team is Lyon which starts Lautier-Anand-Kramnik and can field six 2600-pluses when it has a mind to. IK would probably be about 4th strongest. There could be real chances of their getting the necessary sponsorship, and we understand the French would welcome fresh entries and see publicity value in bringing in a foreign team. (Bit like the Tour de France coming to England for a day?)
